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ABC President's Column by Ken Windom



Issue and Opportunities – February, 2012

One of the major physiological differences between humans and other animals is the ability to communicate verbally. Animals do communicate with audible sounds, of course, and some have a primitive vocabulary, but we are able to create complex languages and express abstract concepts in words. This occurs because of a small bone, called the hyoid, which is located in our throat and forms part of our voice box. Some scientists believe this small bone is the major difference we modern humans replaced the Neanderthal people, despite the fact that Neanderthals survived for millennia under some of the harshest climatic conditions imaginable. Superior communications allowed our direct ancestors to defeat and eventually replace the competition. I mention this to state how essential communication is in our lives. But how does this pertain to ABC? Communication is important for any group or organization, and that includes ABC. We want to know what events are scheduled and when and where they will be held. We want to know who won those events, who was present, how dogs that did not win performed compared to those that did. We want to know what changes the governing body of the club is considering and what the rationale is for such consideration. We want to know what breedings have been done and what puppies are available. In short, our club can only function if there is open communication among ourselves.

For years, the major mode of communication among ABC members was the Magazine. Of course, informal communication has taken place as people talked at meetings and trials and shows and wherever else they congregated, and regional clubs have published newsletters for their members for years. The advent of electronic communication led to the establishment of email "chat" lists and much information is passed around on these forums. However, the number of participants on such lists is small compared to the total membership of ABC. Further, most are not tightly moderated, if they are moderated at all. This is appropriate for people who wish to express their opinions freely about a given topic, but it poses a problem when attempting to assure accuracy.

To keep up with advances in electronic media and to cover changes and news that occur faster than new issues of the magazine can be published, ABC created a website containing information of past and future events. For example, one can look up the winner of any of the

ABC-sponsored championship and/or classic field trials, find out which dogs and people have been elected to the Hall of Fame, check the calendar for upcoming trials and specialties, download premiums, read about the history of major events, find out what motions are being considered by the Board of Directors, and many, many more items. The website does not replace the magazine, nor was it ever intended to do so, but it provides another way of communicating what is going on with the American Brittany Club.

A new mode of communication has recently been launched as well; ABC now has a presence on Facebook. This form of "social media" has become quite popular, especially among the younger people we are attempting to attract. The popularity of such a Facebook presence was proven this past fall following the debut of Facebook pages for the National Gun Dog Championships in October and the National Championship and National Specialty in November. Daily reports of weather conditions, posted dogs, and photographs from the field events and scores/ placements and photos from the Specialty allowed those not able to attend to participate in a virtual fashion. Those pages have now been consolidated into a single Facebook site. The new site will include the same kinds of information as the previous sites plus reminders of upcoming events, links to articles or other items of interest, a copy of all paid advertisements that occur in the magazine, and more. It will not replace the magazine, nor is there any proposal for it to do so. The Magazine will continue to be the official news medium and archive of ABC. The website and Facebook page are intended to complement the Magazine and provide more timely information of selected events. I hope you find them helpful.

It is not necessary to have a separate Facebook account to access the ABC one. Anyone with an Internet connection can see what information is being posted. The Facebook page can be accessed at www.facebook.com/americanbrittanyclub. Again, all you need is an Internet connection.

AMERICAN BRITTANY CLUB BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

NOVEMBER 26, 2011 • BOONEVILLE, AR Submitted by Mary Jo Trimble, Secretary/Executive Secretary

The annual meeting of the ABC Board of Directors was called to order by President Hank Hartnek at 8:10 A.M., November 26, 2011, at Western Bank's Meeting Place, Booneville, AR.

The Secretary called the roll. Directors present were Lisa Pollock, Darlene Dow, Kent Patterson, "Bo" Ackerman, Tom Robin, Jim Brigham, Steve Ralph, Mary Karbiner, Bob Rankin, Stan Truksa, Susan Kerns, Robert Wire, and John Henderson. Directors unable to attend were Ed Janulis and Ray Gorman.

Motion # 1: Motion made by Rankin, seconded by Wire: I move to seat new Directors Susan Kerns and Steve Ralph. 13 yes votes, 0 no votes, Gorman and Janulis absent. Motion passed.

Motion # 2: Motion by Rankin, seconded by Ralph: I move to approve the 2010 Board minutes. 13 yes votes, 0 no votes, Gorman and Janulis absent. Motion passed.

3rd Vice President's Report: President Hartnek introduced 3rd Vice President Chris Ward-Weber who discussed the reasons for her action items presented to the Board of Directors in the Agenda Book. First, she discussed the need to clarify use of American Brittany Club name on vendor's products. Vendors should have permission from the ABC to use the American Brittany Club name on products they are selling. It was determined that we need to see a list of people using the ABC name. Treasurer Janet Chase will send this to ABC Attorney Sharon Wice for an interpretation. Chris then requested that the Dual Champion and Qualifier Classes be dropped from the required classes of the National specialty show. She cited small entries in those classes and yet the need to purchase trophies. She felt that encouraging entries in the Field Trial Class would make for a larger more meaningful class and eliminate alerting judges that dogs entered in the Dual Champion class had attained that coveted title seemingly giving them an edge in the judge's mind. No dogs have ever won from the Dual Champion Class.

Motion # 3: Motion by Kerns, seconded by Brigham: I move to eliminate the Dual Champion and National Qualifier Classes at the National Specialty Show beginning in 2012. 12 yes votes, 1 no vote: Robin, 2 absent: Gorman & Janulis. Motion passed.

Since the Amateur Owner Class had been added earlier in the year by the BOD as a mandatory stake, she asked that instead it be made an optional stake as it was not a mandatory stake required by AKC. The Board rejected a proposal to give the 3rd Vice President blanket approval to have whatever classes he/she so desired. No formal motion was put forth on that particular proposal. It was noted that there were no entries in this year's Amateur Owner Class.

Motion # 4: Motion by Brigham, seconded by Dow: I move to make the Amateur Owner Class at the National Specialty Show be an optional class beginning in 2012. 13 yes votes, 0 no votes, 2 absent: Gorman & Janulis. Motion passed.

Chris then discussed the need to expend some of the Grounds Fee monies to the National Specialty Show to cover their costs. Fifty cents of each \$2 collected for starters in field trials, regional specialty shows and hunt tests is designated for use as a Grounds Fund. She wanted to see monies collected from regional specialty show entries be designated for use by the National Specialty Show.

Motion # 5: Motion by Rankin, seconded by Wire: I move that fifty cents of the grounds fund money collected from ABC Regional Specialty Shows go to the National Specialty Show budget. 11 yes votes, 2 no votes: Patterson & Robin, 2 absent: Gorman & Janulis. Motion passed.

Chris had asked for comments regarding the addition of an Agility Event at the National Specialty Show. She did not want a motion but wanted opinions. If held, it may have to be on Monday following the show and she would want a volunteer to head up the Agility Show Event. Directors did express opinions that agility events are often money makers for clubs who hold these events in conjunction with their shows.

Chris said the Show Superintendent had informed ABC that AKC had passed a rule effective November 1, 2011, that show catalogs could not be released until the day the show starts. ABC will check into this. (Subsequent calls to AKC verified that because of the long history of combining the National Championship and National Specialty Show into one yearbook that ABC would be exempt from this new rule.)

1st Vice President's Report: President Hartnek introduced 1st Vice President Tom White. Tom discussed the increase in entries in the Open which was certainly welcome from a financial standpoint. We had three pros in attendance this year that were not here last year. We had 117 entries this year in the two stakes. He discussed the combined experience and ability of the current judges and felt we had two excellent panels. He said he is a firm believer in keeping the three judge panels. The weather this year was what it was. Flooding forced the trial to revert to a continuous course on high grounds of part of course one and course three.

He announced that Larry McAnally will be retiring after our event. Red will not be retiring at this time. The Regional Fish & Game Manager is attuned to our needs and is supportive of continuing efforts for field trials at Blue Mt.

Will Langley, horse wrangler, was unable to attend this year due to mechanical problems with his vehicle. We have made do and suggested that we explore some background work before committing to the expensive proposition of hiring a wrangler in the future. We need to explore insurance coverage either by ABC or those who provide horses for participants and what requirements are by the state of Arkansas. Will Langley does have insurance coverage in the State of Michigan.

The Secretary said she still had the book of signed waivers required by a previous underwriter a few years back.

Tom discussed Sponsors. We lost Christie Saddles as of January 2012. Various saddle dealers were suggested to be contacted for sponsorship. We also should consider contacting horse trailer manufacturers, ATV manufacturers, truck manufacturers and Garmin. Tom's focus this year will be to go after more sponsors that would be allowed given the contracts with our current sponsors. Mary Jo suggested getting sponsors for specific national events as opposed to overall ABC sponsorship. Bob Fleury, Magazine Committee Chair, suggested always getting a contract in writing

so that we always know what was agreed to, especially as relates to magazine ads, etc.

He still has the expensive print that has been donated to the ABC for national expenses. Steve will look into how this could possibly be sold on E-Bay.

Tom discussed the Lady Handler Award and suggested either doing away with it or dropping the requirement of having three women handling to two or possibly adding a Rookie Handler award. Others suggested a Handler Award for men and women. No motions were forthcoming.

He informed the Board that the State of Arkansas had decided to not buy the Peter Kainz acres across the road from the headquarters. Directors expressed concern that if the ground is sold for subdivisions that we could run into problems with neighbors objecting to traffic, barking dogs, etc. that other grounds have experienced.

President's Report & Action Items:

Qualifications: Darlene Dow expressed a desire to update the Gun Dog Qualifications to match the changes made last year for the All Age Open Qualifications which allowed dogs in large 30 minute stakes to qualify with 3rds and 4ths. This was discussed with a suggestion that Dow bring back a proposal to be voted on by the Board later in the meeting.

Location of All Age Championship: Every year President is required to update the request to run the National Championships on the Blue Mt. Grounds. Currently the agreement is for three years. In the past, it had been for five years.

Motion # 6: Motion by Brigham, seconded by Ralph: I move to continue using the Blue Mt. Grounds for the National Championships for the next five years on a rolling commitment. 13 yes votes, 0 no votes, 2 absent: Gorman & Janulis. Motion passed.

DNA Testing: President Hartnek said he had had input from some members requesting that DNA be required by all participants in national events. He had also had input from members who are owners of agility and obedience dogs who may or may not be purebred Brittanys and participate with an ILP number issued by AKC. This proposal would prevent them from participating. Scientists are developing DNA tests to detect breed identification but currently that does not appear to be perfected and costs would be over \$300 per test. A discussion ensued as to whether or not agility and obedience dogs should be Registered Brittanys only or open to All Breeds and/or ILP dogs. Profit wise it would be beneficial to the show to allow all breeds in those events. Currently, DNA tests only register a dogs individual DNA and can be matched to parents if they too have been tested and registered. Current DNA samples are not "verified by tatoo marks or microchips by a vetrinarian as to the dog" from whom the swab was taken. Owners currently submit swabs with no verification of the actual dog swabbed which does allow cheating to take place if an owner is so inclined. To be an American Field Champion, you must have DNA submitted within 30 days after winning a championship. AKC also has DNA requirements for frequently used sires. No motions were presented.

Executive Secretary/Secretary Action Items: Mary Jo Trimble discussed the four action items in her report. The following motions resulted:

Motion #7: Motion by Patterson, seconded by Kerns: I move to accept Action Item #1 of the Executive Secretary's Report on page 28 which would remove Section 9 of the Dog HOF section of the policy book which gives monies to owners of dogs inducted into the Brittany Field Trial Hall of Fame in Grand Junction, TN if they

elect to have a portrait done of their HOF Dogs.

13 yes votes, 0 no votes, 2 absent: Gorman & Janulis. Motion passed.

Rationale presented by Secretary Trimble on that motion was that the BFTHOF is a separate entity from the ABC HOF and does not necessarily recognize ABC HOF dogs as was thought to be the case when this policy was enacted. It does not recognize all ABC HOF Dogs, particularly those who are mainly conformation selections

The Dog HOF Committee Chair had suggested requiring only one vote from his committee members for submitting nominations to the BOD for final selection. Based on the reasons he presented, the Secretary concurred and submitted the action item # 2 on page 28 of the Agenda Book. The Board did not act on this item.

Motion #8: Motion by Rankin, seconded by Brigham: I move to pass Action Item #3 of the Executive Secretary's Report on page 28 of the Agenda Book which incorporates a housekeeping item removing wording which makes the ABC Secretary in charge of all corporate filings and associated papers and renumber this section. 13 yes votes, 0 no votes, 2 absent: Gorman & Janulis. Motion passed. Rationale: A legal firm has been in charge of acting as corporate agent for the ABC for many years.

Motion #9: Motion by Rankin, seconded by Brigham: I move to accept action item #5 of the Executive Secretary's report on page 28 of the Agenda book which removes Section 27, page 53, of the Executive Secretary part of the policy book requiring the Executive Secretary to keep a record of the number of litters nominated for the futurity. 13 yes votes, 0 no votes, 2 absent: Gorman & Janulis. Motion passed. Rationale: At one time this was part of the duties of the Executive Secretary but it is now handled by the two futurity

Treasurer's Report: Janet Chase went over several items listed on page 30 of the Agenda Book. Discussion took place as to how the National Events could be more cost effective and steps that could be taken to ensure a breakeven event. She reviewed current financials received from the Gun Dog nationals but not all expense/income stats have been received at this time. No formal action was taken on any items at this time but National Raffle will be discussed later in the meeting.

AKC Delegate Report: AKC Delegate Tighe asked the Board to donate to AKC's Mean Seed Project as we have a lot of dogs affected by mean seeds. The Board felt the AKC had not given enough information regarding what exactly this project involved as mean seeds were already identified and treatments prescribed. This study seemed to deal with the effect of mean seeds on dogs running on CPR lands. The Secretary read more information from the AKC website. No action was forthcoming.

The President went over comments gleaned from the various committee chairs who submitted reports with no action items involved.

Break at 10:30. Meeting resumed at 10:45.

ABC Raffles: A long discussion took place regarding the raffles held at the various 5 National Championship events. In the past, the prize raffle proceeds went to the National Championship. The last few years, the proceeds from this raffle have been split 5 ways toward the budgets of the 2 Gun Dog National Stakes, the two All Age National Stakes, and the National Specialty Show. This year the National Specialty Show held its own silent auction as did the All Age field trial group. Discussion centered on which way would the most people elect to participate and how should this be accomplished.

Motion # 10: Motion by Karbiner, seconded by Rankin: I move to return to the original program of each venue (National Specialty Show, National Gun Dog Championships and National All Age Championships) holding their own raffle/fund raiser therefore allowing people to support the event/venue of their choice. Each event will be in charge of organizing their own raffle if they choose to have one which will be run under the guidelines set forth in the Policy Notebook/National Auction Committee. Under this motion, there will be an overall chair of the Auction/Raffle Committee with three sub-chairs appointed to oversee the raffle/fund raising for the three separate venues.

9 yes votes, 4 no votes: Pollock, Dow, Brigham, Ackerman, 2 absent: Gorman & Janulis.

Motion Passed.

Lunch Break: 12:20. Meeting resumed at 12:50.

Motion # 11: The monies allocated for each venue's raffle will be \$1200 for the Gun Dog Nationals, \$1200 for the All Age Nationals, and \$600 for the National Specialty Show. The guidelines fall under the auspices of the Auction/Raffle Committee as outlined in the Policy Book. There will be one national raffle chair and three sub chairs representing each venue. 13 yes votes, 0 no votes, 2 absent: Gorman & Janulis. Motion passed. Rationale: Earlier in the meeting, the Board moved an estimated \$600 from the Grounds Fund fees to offset the National Specialty Show Budget thus giving them a total increase of \$1200 approximately as is the case for the other two venues.

More agenda reports were discussed and highlights of each pointed out. Classics, Dates Conflicts, and other topics were discussed with no formal motions being proposed.

Futurity: Lisa Pollock, Futurity Committee Chair, discussed the ABC Futurities and went over the housekeeping items that need to be updated in the policy book as outlined on page 60 of the Agenda Book with the addition of the words "First Futurity" before the word Secretary in item # 3, page 103.

Motion 12: Motion by Pollock, seconded by Brigham: I move to accept the Pollock items on page 60 of the Agenda Book that reads as follows with the addition of the final item:

Page 98, 5th paragraph under "Litter Forfeits", change to read:

Late litter nominations will be accepted as late as 180 days from whelping. Late fees are \$30 for 31-60 days, and additional \$30 for 61-90 days, and additional \$100 for 91-180 days. Nominations after 180 days will be at the discretion of the Futurity Committee. The ABC Board of Directors may impose additional late fees from time to time. The postmark will determine the fee for late nomination.

Page 100, 2nd paragraph under "Dates"

Remove the sentence: "The futurity may be held during the fall or the spring" Move the other sentence in that paragraph to the end of the first paragraph.

Page 101, 1st paragraph under "Budget"

Change "September 15" to "final forfeit".

Page 102, 4th paragraph

Remove: "and patches"

Page 108, second paragraph, change to read:

The dog must hunt for its handler at all times, at a suitable gun dog range. It must cover adequate ground, but not range out of sight for a length of time that would detract from its usefulness as a class Gun Dog.

Page 103, section # 3, add First Futurity in front of word Secretary.

13 yes votes, 0 no votes, 2 absent: Gorman & Janulis. Motion Passed.

Magazine Committee: Bob Fleury, Chair of the Magazine Committee was in attendance and was asked to address the Directors. He noted that we were now exchanging ads with several national publications. We have a new contributing editor Peggy Weir in charge of Action at AKC and a new contributing editor Carla Simon in charge of reporting agility and obedience. The new ads and the increase in the agility section of the magazine have resulted in new members for the ABC.

Bob suggested leaving the magazine with no editor and continuing with a Magazine Committee as this seems to be running better under this format with more people being involved in decision making and proof reading. He outlined the problems we had this fall with covers coming off and the steps being taken to correct this problem. We are currently sending our brochure through the AKC rather than through a mailing service. This has been a considerable cost savings for ABC as we no longer have to pay postage as the flyer is included with AKC packet to all people who register dogs with AKC.

Webster County Printing has been sold by Ron Smith to longtime employee Robert Gordon. Ron continues to work at the firm, and we anticipate no changes in service.

National Gun Dog Field Trial Secretary: Darlene Down presented two proposals to the Board regarding Best Bitch Award and Best Lady Handler award at the Gun Dog Nationals.

Motion # 13: Motion by Dow, seconded by Robin: I move to establish and present a non-retireable rotating trophy for the Best Woman Handler at the National Gun Dog Amateur Championship. Guidelines to be established following those used in the Policy Book for the National Amateur All Age Championship. 13 yes votes, 0 no votes, 2 absent: Gorman & Janulis. Motion passed.

Motion # 14: Motion by Dow, seconded by Kerns: I move to establish and present a non-retireable rotating trophy for the highest placing bitch at the Gun Dog Nationals. The owner of the winner shall receive a keeper plaque or trophy similar to those awarded with other non-retireable trophies. This award will be made to the owner of the highest placing bitch in the National Gun Dog Championships with any Open placement taking precedence over any Amateur placement. The name of the award to be determined and guidelines established as per guidelines for the National All Age Championships as contained in the Policy Book. 13 yes votes, 0 no votes, 2 absent: Gorman & Janulis. Motion passed.

Consideration of eliminating the three (3) point major rule in a Brittany Club sponsored trial for a Brittany to become a field champion. Director John Henderson presented each Director with a booklet prepared by Dr. Gordon Theilen on the topic. The booklet contained background information, multiple factors their committee felt was driving the need to change, stats on the number of trials, stakes and entries, with a special section on trials in 2010. He discussed the lack of workers at trials, running trials open to all breeds, and trials that were canceled due to lack of entries.

Some of the stats such as number of trials canceled were challenged as was the rationale presented based on stats reported. One statistic reported that 35 % of clubs did not hold trials or canceled. Only 4 trials scheduled were reported as actually canceled in the fall of 2010 according to stats presented by the Webmaster based on his calendar, and some of those were canceled due to weather conditions or crops still in the field and not because of the 3 point major. Henderson reported that stat was based on the opportunity

to hold a trial. Objections to listing clubs with no # of members supporting the measure was misleading as it may have been only one member out of many who actually supported eliminating the rule while the majority of members may have favored keeping it.. Henderson said he was not provided with the number of members in each club who supported the proposal. Henderson said around 150 people had signed the petition. It was pointed out that 3543 people are full or associate members or members of multiple clubs of the ABC and that 150 members was a very small percentage that expressed a desire to change the rule. While around 40 actual signatures were contained in the proposal in the Agenda Book, the Agenda Book Chairperson did receive petitions with 150 signatures. Another Director pointed out that a petition had been circulated in their region favoring retaining the rule and the petitioner got 95 signatures from their region in one week. Henderson pointed out the distances between trials in the West Coast region and felt people would still drive the distances to support Brittany trials 500 miles away even if the rule were removed. Others felt people would not drive to support Brittany trials if they could go to another breed trial close to their place of residence. One Director remarked that a dog could become a field champion and never run in a Brittany trial.

After a lengthy discussion both pro and con, the question was called by Brigham. President Hartnek asked if Director Henderson wished to make a motion. Henderson said he would withdraw the proposal and go back to the committee supporting it and see if they had further proposals.

From an earlier discussion about changing qualifications for the Gun Dog Nationals, the following motion was made:

Motion # 15: Motion by Dow, seconded by Ackerman: I move to add to the Gun Dog National Qualifications that 3rd place with thirty dogs and 4th place with thirty-five dogs in thirty minute stakes be qualifying placements. 13 yes votes, 0 no votes, 2 absent: Gorman and Janulis. Motion passed.

Blue Mt. Grounds Committee: Tom Milam, the ABC representative on the committee, discussed the workings of the committee, purchase and releasing of birds, and other related items. The Irish Setter Club released 500 birds for the first time this year. Cost of the birds runs about \$6.50 by the time they reach Booneville from Alabama.

National Trophies: Ken Windom said he was in the process of restoring the recently found **Pheasant Classic Trophy.** Costs can be authorized under the President's discretionary funds.

Other items:

A: Steve Ralph mentioned that the Missouri Club wished to be moved to the Midwest Region as their members live in Kansas and they are now running their trials in Kansas. The Board recently moved the Midwest Hawkeye Club into the Central Region as their members live in Iowa and they run their trials in Iowa in the Central Region. A motion was not in order regarding the Missouri Club as it was not in the agenda book but will be presented in the next few days.

B: The President will appoint an oversight committee to look into a permanent Facebook presence on the internet. Rules will need to be established as to who and what can be posted.

Nominating Committee: Dow reported on the Nominating Committee's slate of officer nominations: President Ken Windom, 2nd Vice President Judy Robin, 4th Vice President Jeff Currier and Treasurer Janet Chase. Directors elected and announced at the Membership Meeting were: East Coast Lisa Pollock, East Central Dan Ridel, Central Tom Jagielski, Midwest Tom Milam, West Coast

Bob Wire.

Motion # 16: Motion by Rankin, seconded by Brigham: I move to confirm all votes taken by email since the last physical meeting of the Board. 13 yes votes, 0 no votes, 2 absent: Gorman & Janulis, Motion passed.

Board went into Executive Session.

Board came back into the Open Meeting.

Motion # 17: Motion by Rankin, seconded by Wire, I move to accept the slate of officers as presented by the Nominating Committee. 13 yes votes, 0 no votes, 2 absent: Gorman & Janulis, Motion passed.

Motion # 18: Motion by Brigham, seconded by Ralph: I move to set up a job search committee to fill the Membership Data Chair position. 12 yes votes, 1 no vote: Kerns, 2 absent: Gorman & Janulis, Motion passed.



Basis for Motion:

Since the Missouri Brittany Club based in Kansas City, MO has operated for decades with significant membership in Kansas, as well as, coordinated the majority of field trial events/activities with clubs in the Midwest Region, the following motion to is being made to maximize the viability of one of the oldest clubs within ABC. NOTE! The motion does not change any of the existing region designation except to flip the "30 mile" radius/bubble currently excluding the Kansas City, MO and Kansas City, KS from the Midwest Region to one in which those metropolitan areas would be included in the Midwest region.

Proposed:

MIDWEST REGION: North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, including that portion constituting a thirty (30) mile radius to the immediate northeast, east and southeast of Kansas City, Missouri, to include the general vicinity of Kansas City, Kansas and Kansas City, Missouri, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Colorado and Wyoming.

Proposed:

THE LAST BOBWHITE, DAVE KENNEY'S OUTDOORS IN FACT AND FICTION

"OUAIL: The Aristocrat of Game Animals"

In the portions of Illinois suited by climate and habitat for good populations of quail, the pursuit of bobwhite gave great pleasure to hunters. The quail was sort of the aristocrat of game animals in those days. It was small and typically took several shots on the average to bring one to the bag. Therefore, persons interested in hunting primarily for the table tended to leave the quail alone.

Often it was the village or city dweller who came out to the farm to pursue this bird, especially in the decade of the 1920's, when the roads were just being improved and the automobile was common enough to allow the hunter to get out in the countryside.

The hunter and his bird dog were welcomed by the farm family more often than not, because they could bring to bag the quail that sometimes became a nuisance around the barn yard in bad weather as they competed with the chickens and other fowl for the grain that was thrown to them. The farm family was glad to have quail numbers reduced, and to share in the tasty feast that followed. Quail were more numerous then. If one goes back 50 years, quail hunting in the southern one-third of the state was probably as good as one could have found anywhere.

The most common bird dog of half-a-century ago was almost certainly the English Setter, that came coated in various mixtures of black and brown and white, and in various sizes and configurations. The English Pointer was not then as popular as it later became. One did not find the more exotic breeds of bird dogs, the so-called continental breeds such as the German Shorthaired, Brittany, Vizala, and Weimaraner, that have become more common since. So, to yesteryear's bird hunters the dog was in most cases the setter, and usually in the rest, the pointer.

Bird hunts in those days were often all day affairs. Hunters would be up before dawn and out in the Model-T bouncing over miles of rutted and often muddy roads, with the dogs occupying the back seat. Bird dogs were expected to last all day; not simply for an hour or two. Knowing that their task was to hunt all the day, they often went at it at moderate pace and range. But hunt they did; all day long.

The rural countryside was very different decades ago. Draft animals still were commonly used for farming, and that meant that a good deal of land had to be devoted to crops of hay and oats to feed the horses and mules of the farms. Crop fields were small and wood lots abounded, as did small waterways, and lines of willow trees and other cover courses across the countryside.

The quail hunter, as he rambled about, often was privileged to see unusual sights and have unusual experiences. I can recall the still-occupied log cabins that we sometimes found in hunting the back country, with smoke spiraling up on a still, clear fall afternoon from their chimneys. Occasionally the hunter would sign a fox or

a white-tailed deer and have an extra thrill added to the hunt. Deer were not then nearly as plentiful as they are today.

Autumn came and the corn fields were picked, with the stalks left standing as they usually were, and the wheat stubble rolling away brown and crisp often seeming to reach to the horizon, conditions were well suited to take to the field with a companion or two of either four legs or two.

Lunch often was eaten in the field, perhaps leaning against the trunk of a tree or an abandoned building. I can recall an old schoolhouse where we often began a hunt—the West Point School in White County. A cistern lay on the south side of the building so that on a crisp fall day you could have your lunch there seated on the concrete of the cistern top warmed by the sun and sheltered from the wind.

With half-a-day of hunting over and half yet to go, some birds in the bag and hopes for more, nothing could be more satisfying than a ham and cheese sandwich, or on the days following Thanksgiving, one of turkey made from the remnants of the holiday feast, washed down with a cup of coffee from a thermos. No meal ever tasted any better.

Quail are very tasty on the table, whether baked or fried or cooked in some exotic fashion as in a baking dish and covered with cream. The bobwhite quail is a delicacy of the first order.

Performance Puppy Testing by Carla Simon



Animal behavior research suggests that the boldest, most playful pup in a litter is the most likely to succeed in performance events (Svartberg K. Shyness-boldness predicts performance in working dogs, Applied Animal Behaviour Science 79 (2002) 157-174). While testing adults according to the "Dog Mentality Assessment" is most strongly predictive, informal testing a litter of puppies can help you to identify puppies that are more likely to succeed in future dog sports.

BOLDNESS

Svartberg used a complicated statistical analysis of playfulness, curiosity/fearlessness, chase proneness, sociability and aggressiveness. He found one major trait that predicts success and reflects general learning performance. That trait is summarized by "playful, active, friendly, curious, fearless and sociable". He found that high-performing dogs are bolder than low-performing dogs. Among well-performing dogs, there were no breed or sex difference. Bolder dogs are more trainable and perform successfully at a younger age.

Interestingly, one of the most important factors for success is owner experience. It's good to know the human can improve over time. But in the meantime, a dog-savvy friend can help you to test a litter and find a puppy that's a great Obedience/Agility/Rally prospect.

FRONT ANGULATION

Healthier dogs outperform dogs with significant health problems. As far as evaluating the structural soundness as it relates to Obedience/Agility/Rally, the most important characteristic is probably front end angulation. While standing, the dog carries more of its weight on the front than its rear. While jumping, the

While some physical characteristics may change e.g. an undescended testicle may descend or an incorrect bit may transform into a scissors bite, other structural characteristics are likely to remain constant. Some breeders look at newborn pups to evaluate front and rear angulation to pick their favorite. Stacked photos at 8 weeks should allow comparisons of front and rear angulation, limb length, and length of back.

SAMPLE PUPPY TEST FORM

With the assistance of an instructor who has been providing puppy kindergarten classes to all breeds for over 25 years, we compiled some of the most helpful tests to evaluate a litter. When doing these tests:

- . Look for the boldest, most confident puppy
- . Compare littermates (rather than focus on individual scores)
- . Prioritize retrieving, and
- Don't forget structure.

Remember that tests are only a snapshot. The breeder should have more detailed information from extended observation. Hopefully this article will spark some ideas in how you'd like to test your next litter of puppies.



impact of landing falls 100% on the front end. Straighter fronts impair the dog's gait. It can't reach as far forward with every stride. In contrast, dogs with well angulated fronts are likely to be able to succeed in jumping with fewer injuries and greater longevity over their performance careers.

Field Trial Judging

An Interview with Dr. A. H. Nitchman



Editor's (Karoleigh Nitchman) Note. Dr. Alvin H. Nitchman of Hurtsboro, Ala., has successfully competed in field trials since he joined the English Setter Club at age sixteen in 1930. Several multiple champions have carried the Nitchman colors during the past fifty years, notably among them Ch. Pantagleize, Smart, Melita and Pork Roll. He is still an active breeder, amateur trainer and handler. Dr. Nitchman was elected to the Field Trial Hall of Fame in 1980.

K: To begin, how about telling me what you think to be the single most important thing a judge should do.

A: Keep his eyes open.

K: You mean on the dog?

A: Yes, there are too many people judging who look down at the ground, or if they are talking to somebody, they turn and look at that person. A man has to learn, if he is going to judge, to keep his eyes on the dog and to continue to keep his eyes on the dog even though he may be talking to someone.

K: What are the judges' other responsibilities and what are the club officials responsible as far as running rules are concerned?

A: Well, in my opinion, the club can make any rules or qualifications, standards, it wants. I think that's a good thing—that a club should have a standard.

K: And so the club instructs these judges as to what they should be looking for?

A: Yes, and it's the club's (officials) responsibility to

acquaint the judges with the standard that they would like to have the dogs judged by. Now, if a judge doesn't care to judge under that standard, he should refuse the assignment. Once a judge told me, "I heard the standard but I have my own standard." Then he should not have accepted the judging assignment or he should have announced the standard he intended to judge by.

K: For the sake of the poor handlers out there trying to win the dog trial by having their dogs adhere to it?

A: Right. If they read that standard and the club professes to be looking for a dog to fit that standard, then the judge should, to the best of his ability, try to adhere to it.

K: What about the question of running in the rain or other foul weather—whose decision is it?

A: The ultimate responsibility would belong to the judges, but it could certainly be shared with the club officials to decide if conditions are not favorable enough to give each entry his fair shot at winning. Too many times they'll just run on to get the trial over with and the dog doesn't have a fair chance and is running under conditions that a dog couldn't possibly win under.

K: Give me your famous quote about that—hurrying up the trial.

A: Well, it's true. I always say if you came to go home, you should have stayed there.

K: I've often heard you complain about dogs not being given the same chance as others.

A: As far as possible, each dog should be given the same opportunity to win. One time I was at a trial and I was to run a dog in the first brace. Well, in order to get the trial over with that day, instead of running a single brace the next morning, the club officials wanted me to put down my dog at 7:00 a.m. rather than 8:00, the time they had been starting. There was frost on the ground at 7:00 and the sun was just up. I told them that I understood that they wanted to get the trail over and I didn't want any special favors, but I did want the same chance as everybody else had. When I explained how I felt, they agreed with me. More than anyone else, the judge has to see that everyone gets his chance, but often, it's the judge who wants to go home.

K: So if they've been running seven braces a day and one day the club officials say, "today we're going to squeeze in nine," it's the judges who should say no?

A: Right. The judge has the final say.

K: Okay, well what about the pace of the trial—what does the judge have to say about it?

A: The judge sets the pace and if the pace is too fast, it's the judge's fault and nobody else's. If the handler wants to be a mile in front of the gallery, the judge should send a marshal to tell the handler to slow down. Many men say, "Well, if we just don't follow him, he'll get the idea," but that's wrong. There are two handlers and that front belongs to both of them. So if the judge just doesn't follow and one handler rides way out, the handler has to as well, whether he wants to or not, and that's not giving him a fair chance to show his dog the way he would like. If the judge just sits back and refuses to follow, he penalizes both dogs instead of just the one the handler is pushing.

I think the handlers today ride too far to the front. The handler comes out and maybe he only rides the braces in which he runs a dog. He races up on a little hill or rise and he's a half mile to the front, and he sits up there and points his dog out. Well, he can't be so foolish as to think that the judge who is riding eight or nine hours every day is going to gallop his horse to the top of that hill.

K: Do you think a lot of the problem with judges knowing or not knowing when to decide a thing like that is they are unsure of exactly what their responsibilities are?

A: True. But very seldom is a judge going to say anything to anybody because he doesn't want to make anyone mad. Usually he just goes along at whatever pace the handlers set, galloping his horse when the man points his dog out, taking the easy way out. Now I think that when a dog points, the judge should hurry and get there in a reasonable length of time, particularly in a pheasant trial where the pheasant is not going to stay put. But I think it's foolish to gallop to a stand. The dog is suppose to be broke.

K: So far, from what you've said, the judge's real job is to see that everyone gets an equal opportunity to show his dog. What about the lost dog? The handler you're braced with has lost his and is bellowing around the country trying to get him back.

A: Yes, well in field trials we don't have many rules, but I think when a handler leaves the gallery, he should keep his mouth shut. When he gets way off to the side and continues to make a lot of noise, he's got a good chance of taking my dog with him. That's interfering with your bracemate—like riding off and taking your bracemate's dog. Most handlers will stop and let you call your dog (mainly because that's the way they want to be treated).

K: On the subject of interference, what about judges ordering dogs up?

A: The only time a judge can order a dog up is if that dog is interfering with his bracemate—and interference means trailing, fighting, flushing and chasing birds, refusing to back—in these cases, the dog should be ordered up. If a dog makes a mistake, many times a judge will say, "Well, you can go on and run him, but he's out of consideration."

That's not right. If the dog refused to back or chased, he should go on the rope right then. If you see him refuse to back, he's not going to back when you're not there and so, if you let him run on, you're eliminating his bracemate's chances to have a point honored and that could cost him the trial.

K: How about a judge coming and saying to you, "You've been down for forty minutes and we don't like your dog and we're not going to consider him. You can run him if you want to, but you may as well take him up."

A: Well, that's up to the handler. If the dog doesn't please the judge and he doesn't intend to place him, that's it for the dog.

K: But he can run his dog on. He paid his money; doesn't he have the right to be out there for his full time if he's not interfering with his bracemate?

A: He has every right to run his dog the full time. George Hardin, when he was marshalling or judging, and knew the judges didn't like a dog, would say "Course to the right, dog truck to the left." Many people think that just because they are judges, they have the right to order a dog up just because they don't like him. They do not.

K: Is that in the rule book?

A: According to Bill Brown, interference with a bracemate is the only reason for which a dog can be ordered up.

K: When a judge is judging a field trial, what do you think he should be looking for? Should he have in his mind a picture of the ideal performance and judge according to that?

A: Of course every judge has an ideal that he is trying to attain when he judges a field trial, but that doesn't mean he is always going to attain that ideal. If, as a judge, you think you have dogs that are adequate but there are other dogs who might possibly do the job if you gave them another chance, run a second series. You can call back dogs you think can win if, in your opinion, it will improve the quality of the stake.

K: What about withholding a title?

A: In my opinion, if you have an adequate number of dogs, a representative entry, the dog that wins should win the title. I don't think a judge should withhold a championship title unless there aren't many dogs in the stake or unless they've run dogs a second time and have nothing at all. Dogs can't help it if the conditions are poor.

K: There are so many championships now. It's not as if there were only ten championships in the whole country and the judge withheld the title because no dog seemed of high enough caliber. Okay, the judge knows basically the kind of dog he's looking for. How close a watch should he keep on the handler? A: The judge is being shown the dog. I think a judge should ride at a reasonable pace and in a reasonable place but I see judges who ride in the horsetracks where a course is laid out and don't deviate at all. The judges should take advantage of the terrain, ride up on a hill to look so that he can see what the dog is doing, but I don't think he should follow the handler all the time. He should just try to be in a place where he can see what's going on.

K: You have often stressed that it's the handler's job to show the judge his dog. How about assumptions? Suppose a judge sees a bird in the air and the dog in the vicinity. Should he assume the dog knocked the bird?

A: One time I was running a dog in the pheasant championship, and a bird flew off, high in the air, right to left. After a while, my dog came in the same direction and the judge said to me, "Do you see what I see?" "Well," he said "you see the pheasant and you see your dog..." I said that I couldn't see that the dog had made the pheasant fly just because she happened to be coming in the same direction. She wasn't under the bird but he assumed she had flushed the bird and was chasing it. He just assumed that and threw her out of the stake.

K: How about if the dog had been gone for a while and someone in the gallery says he saw the dog chase some birds?

A: If the judge didn't see it, he has to forget it. You can't judge on assumption.

K: What about if you're running a dog and you're ten minutes into the brace and your dog has a find, you flush the birds and your dog gives a jump?

A: That's a matter of personal preference. Some judges think that's a terrible mistake and throw the dog out. But the dog could go on and have six perfect finds.

K: How about the other way? The dog had five perfect finds and gives a jump on the sixth one?

A: Home Again Mike the (1960) National Champion had pointed sixteen or eighteen perfect coveys of birds but put the last covey up and chased it. They still named him National Champion. It creates a controversy because most people think he's out then. But those three judges thought that his entire performance was the best and they didn't throw out their top dog for one mistake. Some people judge a field trial on the mistakes a dog makes. That's wrong, they ought to choose a dog on his good qualities, a dog who stands out for many reasons. It's possible to swallow a small mistake.

K: You're saying not to throw dogs out to come up with the winner but to pick out the one who pleases you the most—it should be a selection rather than a weeding out. What about the year you and Bob Lindsey named Builder's Addition the Master's All-age Champion?

A: Yes, well he had six finds and jumped to shot on one

of them but he was the dog we liked. He had it all—ran a great race and pointed his birds just right. It all depends on how the dog makes his mistake too. If, when he'd given his jump, he'd though he'd made a terrible mistake and laid down or rolled over and said his prayers, we couldn't have used him. But he made a jump and just stood up there like a bull. So that jump didn't matter to me or the other judge. He was the best dog, Maybe if there had been another dog we liked as much, we may have faulted him for it.

K: I remember there was a handler who gave you a really hard time for that placement.

A: He asked, "Why should we bother to break dogs then?" But what I said to him was that he wasn't judging. I was. And that was the way I saw it. He's entitled to his opinion.

K: What about this business of going to the judges after the trial and asking them about the placements?

A: That's alright. Anybody ought to be able to come to a judge and ask, as long as he asks in the proper way and isn't abusive. You can discuss the stake then.

K: What about discussing the trial during the running?

A: No sir. That's a mistake. While the trial is going on, the judge should keep his own company, not go out drinking with the boys and should keep his mouth shut. I don't think a judge should discuss the stake with anyone during the course of the trial, except the other judge, not the club official or the reporter.

K: What if a handler ran a good dog and is done running and asks the judge if he should go home or stick around?

A: That's alright as long as the handler knows that if the judge tells him to stay it just means his dog is under consideration.

K: Everyone complains about judges. How do you get good judges? Should everyone have to judge?

A: When you judge a trial, it certainly changes how you think. Every professional ought to have to judge if only to give him a little different insight on what the job is. He's used to looking only at his dogs, and then, through rose colored glasses. But when you have to look at everyone else's and none of your own, you come out with a clearer perspective of the whole game.

Alvin Nitchman was a knowledgeable dog man and a highly successful amateur field trial competitor. Many of the dogs he bred, and/or trained and won with made an important contribution to the pointer breed including Ch. Smart, Ch. Pork Roll and Ch. Elhew Strike. He died on February 17, 2000.

Canada South

It used to be open fields of mixed grasses, a little patch of equisetum and plenty of European weeds. It was the site of a future park owned by the Glenn Ellyn Park District. To me it was a place to train my dogs. There were even a few pheasants and an occasional Woodcock during the migration. At the north end there was a small pond with a gravel parking lot and a small grove of trees.

My training buddies were sending their dogs to Manitoba to run on chickens (sharptails) and huns, under the tutelage of a pro trainer. I was keeping my dog at home. Dog training is my hobby and I'm going to go it alone. Besides, in lieu of cash and the inability to exits without one's best friend sleeping at the foot of the bed, one must look for alternatives. I found them in "Canada South", this future park in a Chicago suburb.

I bought two pheasants from a guy who showed up in the parking lot at one of our clubs first hunt tests. He climbed up in the back of his pick up, positioned himself so that I couldn't see and quickly transferred two birds into a burlap sack. I gave him ten bucks, jumped in my truck and headed for Canada South. One of the Junior Hunt Test judges was a field trialer and he told me that if I could get my Lacey dog broke, I could clean up in gun dog stakes and I was going to start breaking that dog right away.

At Canada South, I grabbed the burlap sack and walked out into the grass. I pulled out a rooster and could not believe what I was looking at. It had almost no feathers, just a few on the wing tips. The other one was the same. I planted them with their head under their bare wings and brought my dog in on a check chord. At least they would smell like a pheasants. I walked in front of the dog, holding onto the check chord and nudged the bird expecting it to flap its wings as it ran away. It woke, turned and looked at me and hissed like a hog nose snake. The dog took a step back as if she were in danger of an attack. They say birds are related to reptiles. To me, this was great evidence for that hypothesis.

A month latter, my dog went on point in the same place. I walked in to flush and a beautiful, fully feathered cock pheasant burst into the air. The dog stood there and as I walked back to pet her up, another cock flushed to her right. She went with that one and I wondered- were these my \$10 birds? At least they didn't hiss at her this time.

In the early days of training at Canada South, a Glen Ellyn police

officer pulled into the parking lot as I was coming out of the field. He asked me if I had seen anyone shooting out there and I told him that I was training a bird dog and that I had a starter pistol. He got on his radio and then he informed me that the chief said it was ok as long as nobody complained. He told me to keep the pistol out of sight because if another cop sees it I would probably end up on the ground. I guess there are some drawbacks to training in the suburbs.

After a few years, I was on waving terms with several people at Canada South. The mailman used to kill the clock there when he finished his route early. An older couple would wave as they drove up in separate cars and ended up in one. They had rings, but I'm not sure they were married to each other. A couple of times, I walked out of the field right into some pretty wild teenage love affairs.

Today, the fields have been replaced with four baseball diamonds, a soccer field, some playground equipment and several garden plots. A chain link fence surrounds the entire property. North of the fence is the rear parking lot of a Ford dealership located on a congested four-lane street. The voice of the receptionist can be heard relaying calls to sales and service departments. To the west is an apartment complex with a church and some houses to the south. Across a busy road on the east is a village golf course. The pheasants are gone but the grove of trees is still there and a few acres are still in grass.

I never did get that Lacey dog broke. They say you always ruin your first one and that I did. It wasn't all bad. She taught me what not to do. I have used Canada South to break her son, daughter, granddaughter and great grandson, all field champions. But, like our bird dog way of life, training at Canada South is on its way out. I had a pigeon, hobbled with a piece of garden hose in the Delmar Smith manner, fly on to the pitcher's mound during a game. This is not the type of attention one wants to draw to his sport. I had a lady tell me that I should not be running my dog since there are quail in this park and the dog will disturb them. I informed her that I knew there were quail in the park because I put them there. I should not have added that the neighborhood cats kill them as fast as I release them. People just don't understand.

I may have to be content with a good double play, a stolen base or a double in the gap in a tight game, all this with a leashed dog by my side, but in my memories, it will always be "Canada South" to me.

Hunting & Trialing with Brittanys in South Africa

'The Brittany has passed the test on every type of game for which pointing dogs are used. It has the disposition of the best house pets and companions, and yet a remarkable passion for hunting. It can face any kind of weather. It can be kept within the range of modern hunting conditions. It is small, yet can do a big job.' (Maxwell Riddle, The Complete Brittany).

Brittanys and origins

From as early as the 1850s, wingshooters in Europe were crossing English Setters with small French Land Spaniels giving rise to a dog 'with the ranging qualities of a setter and the hunting perseverance of a spaniel' - the 'Brittany Spaniel' - although thankfully the 'spaniel' part has been dropped. It wasn't until 1924 that the first Brittany was brought to America. Four years later, the first litter was bred and in 1936, the American Brittany Club was founded. Although the breed's popularity was growing, many 'traditional' wingshooters and field trialers still had reservations about the breed; their main question being: 'how will they compare to pointers and setters?' Thus, they waited to see results in field trials. On 20th April 1935, a Brittany was placed third in the Jockey Hollow Field Trial Club's trial in New Jersey, competing with pointers and setters. When Kaer de Cornouaille was placed third in the shooting-dog stake at the same trial in 1938, the American Field reported that 'Kaer ran the course with good judgment and with considerably better pace than most of the pointers and setters running against him. A nice find, followed by a good retrieve, climaxed his race.' So it was that Brittanys started to feature in American Field Trials, putting to rest any doubts about the breed, and making an important mark for the Brittany's future in the country.

This is probably common knowledge to Brittany fans in the USA. However, here in South Africa, we are only just starting to wake up to this wonderful and versatile little gundog. Although we have a history of British-Breed field trialing in the country for just over 100 years, the first Brittanys were only brought into South Africa within the last ± 20 years. The first American Brittanys imported into the country were from Nevene Kennels in Illanois. These dogs were brought in by a couple of individuals (Tim Murry and Dave de la Harpe) in the Eastern Cape and many wonderful hunting dogs were bred from these lines; some of them still around today (although a little grey around the muzzle). About six years ago, another important addition was made to the SA-American line, when Rob Dodds imported a dog and a bitch from Walker's Kennels in Idaho. In parallel with these developments, some French lines were also brought into the country and, due to the lack of available bloodlines, some of these were bred to the Nevene dogs from the USA. Of course, to the purists, this may seem sacrilege, however, these breedings kept our American lines alive and produced the first (and currently only) Brittany to be placed in a field trial in South Africa. My Luka (bitch), out of a French mother and American father was placed first in the maiden stakes and later, third in the championships, in trials against English Pointers and GSPs in the Western Cape. This

added fuel to my growing desire to do something for the breed in South Africa.

However, with a tiny gene pool and thus, very few options available for keeping any of the existing American lines alive in SA, we were reaching a dead-end, in terms of keeping the breed alive in SA. Thus, once we had exhausted all our options, through, for example, a couple of line-breedings back to the Nevene line, we needed to import or the breed would be lost. This problem was exacerbated by the fact that so few people even knew what a Brittany was, never mind hunted over them, making the demand for working pups small.

In 2006, I visited the States and had the honor of being introduced by a friend to a wonderful pointer trainer, Bob Paucek, in Maine. I asked him to advise me about which breeder to speak to about exporting a pup to SA and he immediately suggested Bob Fleury of Birch Hill Brittanys, Connecticut. I got in touch with Bob and he was extremely helpful and accommodating. First, he tried to source us a bitch that he could send over in whelp. This, however, proved to be difficult, as nobody wants to part with their proven bitch. And rightly so: I would not want to either! So, we opted to bring in a male pup instead. Bob decided that the best breeding to get from would be a litter from which he himself was also taking two pups: a breeding between Maxwell's White Spirit (AKA Butch) and Spirit Hill's Mystic Magic (AKA Maggie). Three of us chipped in and contributed to the costs of bringing in a pup – and I was lucky enough to be entrusted to take care of him. Rigby arrived in SA, after a long flight, in September 2008. The excitement of going to the airport and fetching my pup was overwhelming. I expected to find a cowarding, nervous little pup, after his long and traumatic journey from the northern hemisphere, but I opened the crate, he ran around a bit and then ran up to me and started playing! It was love at first site. A beautifully built, perfectly proportioned dog, with lovely long legs and the confidence to match his appearance – exactly what I had been looking for.

Rigby has since developed into a big-running dog with the most phenomenal stamina and an excellent nose. Although soft around the house, he is quite different in the field and to 'reign him in' has been a challenge, to put it mildly. Training him has not been easy and his willingness to learn and focus only developed with age (and this probably applies to both of us). He is really starting to perform now and we have had some really fun days out in the field with him.

Due to the increasing demand for pups and new lines, Bob Fleury again helped us to import another pup in 2011 – this time a bitch, out of Birch Hill's Hobo and Bell of Swansea. This time, in order to reduce the high cost due to our weak currency, five of us contributed to the costs and the pup has gone to Charl Beyers in Johannesburg. We are very excited about seeing this pup develop and breeding her to Rigby, and potentially some other existing lines.

TRIALING & WINGSHOOTING IN SOUTH AFRICA

We train gundogs under tough conditions here in the Western Cape in South Africa. The terrain is mostly flat or hilly, but the vegetation where the birds are found can be quite thick, which makes seeing your dog very difficult. We do not have the luxury of recall pens and other useful training aids for getting our dogs steady on birds. But, we do our very best to spend as much time as we can with our dogs, looking for wild birds in their natural habitat and this can be very rewarding too.

South Africa is a very variable country, in terms of the habitats and terrain that it holds. The eastern parts of the country are beautiful, seemingly endless, rolling hills and mountains of grasslands, full of the 'champagne gamebird' for South Africans: the Greywing Francolin. This small partridge-like bird is wonderful to hunt over dogs, as they fly well and are usually pretty 'honest' birds - i.e. where you see them land is where you will pick them up again. However, down in the southwestern part of the country, we hunt in small pockets of remnant Critically Endangered vegetation (known as Renosterveld), between agricultural fields of wheat, canola, barley and lucerne pasture. These are the habitats favoured by the Cape Spurfowl (more comparable with the northern Hemisphere's pheasant) and the occasional covey of Greywing. And although the slopes of these fragments are often more open and grassy, the lower-lying seepage areas favoured by the Cape Spurfowl are thick and thorny and either impossible to walk through, or impossible to find a dog on point in! Despite these difficult conditions, we have a lot of fun with our dogs in the renosterveld and even manage to hold a field trial in it annually.

Brittanys (fewer than a handful of them) have been running in trials in South Africa for about 10 years. Will those in SA follow a similar path to those in the US? We certainly hope so. Thus far, persistence has paid and the interest in the breed has grown so much that we cannot provide enough pups to meet the demand. This is a noteworthy change, compared with ± 5 years ago when we struggled to place all the pups from a large litter into working homes. However, it is essential that if Brittanys are to grow in their popularity as gundogs in South Africa, more people hunt and field trial with them and that we keep breeding and importing. We certainly hope that one day soon, we can rest assured that their future as a working gundog in South Africa is secured.



Odette Curtis resides in Napier, South Africa. which is located in the Western Cape area, a two hour drive from Cape Town. She has worked in the conservation field for many years and is presently involved in managing the Renosterveld Poject which oversees protection, conservation and management of these highly diverse and critically endangered veld type areas containing several species of flora that do not exist any other place in the world. Her duties involve working with Afrikaaner farmers to protect these areas from being turned into agricultural land or pastures. She has a strong background in the conservation area and has been involved in varied projects from crocodile and black rhino monitoring to game bird studies using her Brittanys. 

The Running:

The start of the first day was delayed a bit due to heavy overnight rain and the judges desire for all dogs to have the best possible opportunity to perform at their peak. We started brace one, with temperatures in the mid 40s with overcast skies and a light breeze; conditions holding similar all day.





BRACE 1: 1A BOURBON'S STRAIGHT UP/REIN (JACK) - 1B DIAMOND HILL DANCER/VENTURA (LUKE) break away on Course 1 with both dogs exhibiting a pleasing gait and speed. Luke was found standing early, just before the large tree island on the right edge and a breach of manners ended his bid. Jack made some nice moves on the way to his first find on the line West of the first pond, prior to Hire's field. He was very stylish and mannerly and was taken on. His second find was 50 yards later on the same line with similar style and intensity. The flush ended with the bird flying directly into this young dog's head proving too tempting a stimulus to ignore!

BRACE 2: 2A COOS RYLEE/R. GORMAN (RYLEE) - 2B HIGH HOPE'S LITTLE ANN/RIEDL (ANNIE) break away in Hire's Field with both dogs a bit slow to get rolling, but this is soon over, with Annie taking the right edge flying to the front for her first find just before the cut and Rylee coming in for a stylish back. This pair continues to the large island before the exit of Hire's Field, where thy have a divided find. These two dogs continued on with Annie having another find on the line opposite the Horseman's Campground. Rylee has a find right after leaving that field on the backside of the line separating the fields. Annie makes a very nice move hitting the right edge downhill, then across to the center line around clockwise to the front of the field just before the Boy Scout bridge. These two had finds together and apart the entire hour, their last being a divided on the last Oak line after we entered the Derby course after leaving Cardiac Hill. Rylee kept his handler on his toes, repeatedly gaining the front on his own, way ahead of Ray. Rylee regularly dug deep into the cover and the woods along the course, showing his Grouse Country roots. Annie's pattern was very pleasing as she rimmed fields, staying fast, forward and consistent until time was called.

Brace 3: 3A TNT'S BLAZING SHOSHONI SHAKE N' BAKE/THOMAS (BUBBA) – 3B EIBHEAR OF AUTEN/TELFARE (BEAR) break away on the Derby course, heading down hill towards the Derby creek crossing. Bear is the victim of a tough break as he establishes point at the 10 second mark out of sight of his handler, who unknowingly calls "here Bear"; the dog coming to his handler running behind the bird. Bubba hunted hard early on in the Derby course before the creek crossing. He made some very nice moves covering the weekend Gun Dog course and having his second find at the small Tree Lot past, due west of the parking lot. He continued on hunting the Orchard and moving on to the old shooting range Oak lines, where a deeply buried bird proved too much temptation for him to resist.

Brace 4: 4a Peter Gun/Carter (Pete) [Dropped to 16b] - 4b Rencroft's

Rascal/McCandless [SCRATCHED]

BRACE 5: 5A SIGBRIT'S CATCH ME NOW/ SIGMUND (CATCHER) - 5B JAZZ'S SWEETEST LITTLE SECRET/HOPPER (KARO) break away on Course 1 with weather and conditions ideal for running dogs. Both dogs get right to work with Catcher and Karo jumping forward and wide to cover the opening lines. Catcher, a young dog, makes nice moves with a pleasing pattern and great ground speed. He shows the potential of becoming a strong contender just as soon as his bird work matures. His style on his first find was very pleasing, until his youth boiled to the surface. He displayed the irony of his name for the next few mins. Karo worked the course taking the woods forward halfway into Hires Field and came across to take the right edge forward to the end and around the Backside. She established point on the near end of the island just before the exit of Hire's field. Due to a swirling wind, Karo relocated herself to the far end of the island after point was called. She was picked up at this point ending her bid. Karo did not seem to be her usual self today, having spent over 20 mins. the day prior, tangled by her collar in a snarl of old fence running in the Open Championship/

BRACE 6: 6A BULLOCH'S FIRST IN LINE ALVIN/BULLOCH (ALVIN) - 6B SWEETWATER'S MURP'S A GAMBLER/BATES (MURPHY) broke away in the field by the Horseman's Campground. Both dogs taking the right center line forward and disappearing early. Halfway through the first field, Murphy is found stylishly pointed on line running away from the middle of the field. Larry flushed and fired on a very nice find with excellent manners. The pair continued after the shot and as they round the





corner, Alvin is found standing buried deep where Murphy and Larry just broke away from. Talk about pressure for a dog! John must walk a ways to get back to where Alvin's been buried since shortly after breakaway. John had a very difficult time getting the bird located and flushed; Alvin came through the entire ordeal with flying colors. This pair moves on to catch the front with their brace mates two fields ahead. Alvin takes the front with a fast and flowing pattern and catches Murphy half way through the dog leg field. Alvin moves on a Murphy rejoins the front with Larry having to jog awhile to catch up. Murphy digs into the woods after taking the front and Larry eventually calls for the tracker. Alvin continues on to card a total of 8 finds, with 2 pairs of them being within 50 yards of each other on two separate occasions; one pair at the woods edge before the Boy Scout Bridge and again on the Derby course. He exhibited a wonderful pattern and pleasing speed during the balance of his hour, finishing at the Derby creek crossing.

BRACE 7: 7A PENELOPE OF COOS/R. GORMAN (PENNY) — 7B SPRING HILL'S HOT WHEELS/BELL (WHEELS) break away at the Gun Dog parking lot with both dogs moving out nicely. Wheels establishes point and Penny backing on a covey of birds before the orchard with both dogs looking very stylish. Upon release, both dogs fly ahead deep into the orchard and are found with Penny buried deep in the cover and Wheels backing. A breach of etiquette ends Wheels' bid; a fast, young dog, with a bright future. Ray and Penny move on having a second find before the exit of the orchard with all in order. They continue on to have a third find on the Oak line at the old shooting range. After crossing the dike Ray elected to pick up Penny at the 40 min. mark as she was no longer pleasing him. Prior to that point, she had exhibited great speed and the ability to make some beautiful moves between her three finds.

END OF DAY 1 – POSTED DOGS: COOS RYLEE, HIGH HOPES LITTLE ANN, BULLOCH'S FIRST IN LINE ALVIN

DAY 2 – We awaken to clear skies, temperatures below freezing and a beautiful glaze of frost across the landscape with the trees glistening in the morning sun; temperatures warm as the day goes on into the high 50s.

BRACE 8: 8A MR. P'S DEVIL DOG OF COOS/ POLAND (DEVIL DOG) – 8B GINJAC'S HEATIN' IT UP/CURRIER (CAJUN) break away on course 1 with both dogs taking the right edge and found standing on a divided find by the large tree island with all in order. Upon release the pair works independently of each other and has a second divided find just before

the cut leading to the backside of Hire's field. Devil Dog has impeccable style and intensity on point. Upon release, Cajun establishes point 20 yards down the line for his third find. Both dogs are found again at the tree island before the exit of Hire's field with Cajun buried deep in side the cover and Devil Dog backing well of the cover on the outside edge opposite of Cajun. Upon release, both dogs take to the Old Barn field and are found immediately around the corner pointing on the line separating the two fields for their third divided find. We enter into the back field to find the pair stopped again, with Cajun pointing and Devil Dog backing with beautiful style and intensity.

BRACE 9: 9A LITTLE ROCK IT MAN/WESSELS (ROCK IT) - 9B FOSTER'S BUDDY II/FOSTER (BUDDY) break away at the Derby course fast and independent of each other. Both dogs rapidly make their way to the islands of the Derby orchard quickly searching the area with Buddy snapping to point just prior to the end of the line before crossing the creek. Before where Buddy is pointed in the orchard area, Rock It is carded with a stylish find of his own, as Gordon is flushing for Buddy. Both dogs break away together and fly to the front along the swamp edge leading to the Gun Dog parking lot. They fly through the early fields of the Gun Dog course with Buddy making an impressive move along the left edge. He carries it the entire way forward along the swamp, crossing from left to right to the entrance of the Gun Dog orchard while Rock It is making nice moves of his own. Buddy has his second find midway through the orchard. He then takes the left edge forward and across the front while Rock It flies along the right side of the orchard. We exit the orchard a sBuddy takes the wood's edge on the left while Rock It takes the filed edge on the right. Buddy continues to hug the edge all the way around and through the Oak Bottom of the shooting range in a clockwise fashion to his third find on the near side, just past the intersection of the four lines. Rock It is taking the far edge of the Oak line counter-clockwise, then continues on up towards the lone Big Oak. Gordon produces two birds for Buddy and fires with all in order and moves on with Shan and Rock It half a field ahead; Shan crosses the dike with Rock It. Gordon makes it to just before the dike with no Buddy in sight. Gordon stays at this point calling for Buddy as Shan and Rock It move on and cross the dike. Shan sends Rock It ahead after crossing and Rock It gets right to work hunting the clumps of trees and brush on the backside of the swamp as we hear Gordon whistling his scout in. At this point, sprints non-stop across the dike racing to catch the front, with Buddy well ahead of him. Buddy gets right to work covering the right edge along with Rock It and then takes to the left edge along he swamp the entire way and across the front to

find some deer hunters looking for a buck they've just arrowed. Rock It is found standing high and tight on the right edge on the hillside prior to entering the next field but Shan cannot produce a bird and takes Rock It on after flushing diligently. Rock It regains the front and does a very nice job taking edges and establishes point on his second find, along the N/S tree lines separating the two large fields after the uphill climb. Shan produces a bird easily this time and fires. Meanwhile, Gordon and Buddy have a find of their own a field ahead in the corner a swell as another find in the next field that they encounter with excellent style and intensity as reported by the judges. Buddy and Gordon continue to fly forward and are next seen by the reporter as they enter the field just after crossing the Gun Dog dike with Buddy maintaining his fast pace and pleasing pattern and is found pointed for his sixth and final time, on the Derby course just after cresting the hill from the bridge crossing. Time expires as Gordon is flushing; he produces a bird and fires with all in order. Gordon takes Buddy on and as the dog flies forward, time is officially called by the judges. Shan and Rock It finish their hour a field before the bridge crossing. What a great brace to watch.

BRACE 10: 10A SUEMAC'S LIBERTY BELLE/MCPHERSON

(LIBBY) - 10B HY STEPPIN MAGGIE/SENNOTT (MAGGIE) break away on the back side of the Derby course heading East with both dogs working towards the center Oak line with Belle having her first find at the right end of the line. Belle is high and tight on the birds and Roger flushes and fires with all in order. Meanwhile, Maggie has moved forward and established point on the next cross line, a field apart from Belle. Belle is turned loose and streaks across the file to establish a back. Chris flushes and fires and both handlers collar their dogs. During this event, Judge Clasen's horse decided that it

couldn't see the find and reared up to get a better look. Unfortunately, this greatly obscured Fran's view. Judge

Clasen got back in the saddle after catching his breath and the brace and stake continue. A week later we learned that Fran actually broken two ribs — speaking volumes to his physical toughness and determination to fulfill his judging assignment! Upon gaining the top of Cardiac Hill, both dogs get to work checking out the available objectives. These dogs trade turns pointing and backing for the remainder of the brace. Maggie exhibits excellent style on her three finds and three backs, and Libby shows that she can really fly once she hits an edge with both dogs finishing the hour in the Old Barn field. Libby had four finds and two backs.

BRACE 11: 11A SGT'S SMOKY MTN. MOONSHINE/SARGENT (JACK) – 11B DERAILED/C. CROPEK (TEDDY) break away on course 1 with both dogs blasting forward. Teddy is next seen taking the line entering the second field far to the right in a hurry. He's not seen for awhile and when he finally does reappear is wildly taking the far edge of the Dog Leg field around to the front. Jack is found pointed on the backside of the center tree dugout in the second field. Sandy flushes a bird and a nice buck out of the cover with all in order at the shot and she moves Jack on. Teddy is found pointed forward on the West line of the dog leg field with impeccable style and intensity on his bird. Cindy flushes, fires and takes Teddy on running to regain the front with Teddy taking the line forward into Hire's field while jack is found standing again on the line just west of the first pond; Sandy flushes the bird and fires. Teddy is next

seen rimming Hire's field to the southern end while Jack is standing again 60 yards down from his second find. Upon relocating and not being able to produce a bird, Sandy takes Jack on and he takes the center line of Hire's field forward to have another find at the end of the line. Teddy has continued to fly around the backside of Hire's field and into the next field swinging wide to take the right edge on the far side, running parallel and then across the front and forward into the next field past the Horseman's Campground where he's found on point high and tight. Upon being unable to produce a bird in the thick tangle of cover, Cindy elects to move Teddy on. He takes the center line between the next two fields, then he picks up the Northern edge of the Dog Leg field forward and disappears into the corner. Teddy's found pointed on the back edge of the N/W corner of the Dog Leg field with beautiful intensity and style. Teddy takes the front and is found pointed a fourth time; downhill, deep in the cover on the middle line of the field before the Boy Scout Bridge. Cindy has a tough time getting the bird to fly, then flushes and fires and takes Teddy on. Sandy elected to pick Jack up at the 50 min. mark; he was credited with a total of four quality finds but had slowed in his application. Teddy continued to remain wild and forward finishing his hour taking the first Oak

Line as we entered the Derby course all the way to the end as time expired.

PRADO/CASSELBERRY (RICO) –

Due to a desire to hunt

drove forward and took the first Oak line from left to

to the Derby course; once there, both dogs

right and disappeared. Rico returns with a live bird and Les elects to pick him up. Maisy returned a bit later from the right and points a stiff, dead bird along where the line crossed the path. Moving on alone, Maisy makes some nice moves digging in and out of the woods and the thick cover all along the uphill climb to the Quarry. In the Quarry field she gets sticky in her pattern checking the brush piles towards the edge of the Quarry where she has her first find. A Rooster pheasant is spied running in the brush by Judge Cohen. I flopped around to finally flush it and fire. We cross the bridge heading back to the All Age course taking it backwards now with Maisy taking the Northern woods edge line, disappearing forward on the outer edge of the Dog Leg field. She's found pointed at the end looking high and tight. A lone quail is produced deep into the cover with Maisy far off the edge looking in. After firing and collaring Maisy, I elected to pick her up as she wasn't beating the top dogs and I'm sure judge Clasen's ribs were really hurting too.

END OF DAY 2 – POSTED DOGS: GINJAC'S HEATIN' IT UP, FOSTER'S BUDDY II. DERAILED

DAY 3 - Dawn breaks on a clear day after overnight rain with the temperature around 45 degrees and no frost; beautiful day and conditions for running dogs.

BRACE 14: 14A DIAMOND HILL DANGEROUS MAN/POLLOCK (TRACE) – 14B HIGH HOPE'S FLY'N FANCY FREE/A. CROPEK (FANCY)



bread away on course 1. Fancy cards the first find on the backside of the dugout where Al flushes the bird with ease and moves on to rejoin Lisa and Trace with Fancy having a second find on the right edge just opposite the pond. The bird lifts before Al gets there to flush and Al fires with confidence and collars her moving forward again. Meanwhile Trace has taken the center line of Hire's field and has his first find towards the end, while Fancy catches the front in time to back Trace. The dogs work the backside of Hire's field and disappear behind the Tree Island just prior to the end of the field. Fancy is found standing and Trace returns from the woods edge to back. Al produces multiple birds and fires; both dogs move on with Trace establishing point towards the end of the right line opposite the Horseman's Campground. Lisa steps in to flush after Fancy joined the scene backing. After the find the dogs move on and fly through the next fields with Trace making a beautiful move all the way round to the front and into the Dog Leg field, while Fancy takes the right line forward to the end to ioin him. They both fly around the Northern edge of the field and disappear. They're found together again with Trace standing stylishly, deep in the line on the backside of the Dog Leg field; Fancy is backing him beautifully 12 feet of the edge of the cover. Fancy has her fourth find at line in the center of the downhill field leading to the Boy Scout Bridge with a difficult flush ending with all in order. Trace really started to roll, taking the field edges and heads to the bridge. Both dogs continue, nicely working cover and flying around the fields finishing their hour at the Derby course.

BRACE 15: 15A BEELINE OH SUZANNAH/MCCLURE (SUZIE) – 15B CISCO'S ROCKY/R. GORMAN (ROCKY) breaks away on the Derby course with a light fog rolling in along the swamp. Suzie flies forward and is soon seen standing way off the end of the line of the Derby Orchard, just before the creek crossing. Rocky does an equally beautiful job backing, far off of Suzie making for quite the picture! The handlers both stroll casually to their dogs. Steve takes an equally long time flushing, finally chasing after a running bird and firing. Both dogs move on and streak along the swamp edge towards the Gun Dog parking lot and disappear behind the Dike hills. Rocky is found standing on the Dike path facing back towards where we've just come from and Suzie ends her bid failing to back. Bill flushed for an eternity thoroughly covering the hillside opposite Rocky twice, and then moving to do the same on the hillside behind him to no avail. Bill reluctantly relocates Rocky, who finds the bird with gusto, where Bill had just stepped and flushed prior to the relocation. Both of these dogs were holding our attention while it lasted.

BRACE 16: 16A JETER III /R. GORMAN (JETER) – 16B PETER GUNN/CARTER (PETE) [From 4a] break away on the Gun Dog course

exhibiting nice flowing patterns working independently of each other. Jeter is very fluid in his motion and has great speed. Jeter is found standing on the Northern edge of the Orchard with excellent style and manners. Ray has an easy job flushing the bird, fires and is about to release him when Pete is found standing further down the same line. Jim flushes and fires and both handler release their dogs together. Jeter makes quick, fluid work of the remaining Orchard islands and exits the area, while Pete moves forward along the right line and works it to the end where he's found standing for his second find. Upon release, Pete takes the right side edge of the shooting range field and crosses to the left woods edge taking it clockwise around to the crossing of the Oak lines where he's found standing and Jeter unfortunately

is picked up for failing to back. Jim moves him on and Pete continues working the lines forward and after crossing the dike is found standing on the hillside just past the exit to the upper courses. Moving on after the find, Pete quickly establishes point again before exiting the field with all in order. Soon after entering the small field before the short, steep hill, Pete is found standing again for his sixth find in the N/W corner. Upon release, Pete takes the edge forward and checks out the hillside just past the exit to the short steep hill and has his seventh find where Jim soon discovers that he's out of blanks in the gun and calmly, quickly and accurately places one shell in the gun and fires on the first pull of the trigger. Upon heading up the hill, Pete is found standing on his eight and final bird on the Northern end of the last line between the fields with all in order. Jim and Pete finish their hour in the field just past the dike to the Gun Dog parking lot. Pete spent his hour either hugging an edge or pointing birds.

Closing thoughts: Thanks to everyone involved running the trials that qualify dogs for this event each and every year. Without the volunteers in all the clubs across this country, this port would cease to exist, and it's the people and our time together that makes this sport enjoyable and worth all the time, effort and sacrifices it takes to be involved. Be sure to thank those workers at all the trials you attend over the course of the coming season and lend a helping hand where and when you can. Especially thank the Officers of your local and national organization. Here's to wishing everyone success in 2012, and hoping that your Field Trial dreams come true. –Mike Poehler

HIT ME WITH YOUR BEST SHOT by Jessica Hlebak



Keeping your horse healthy and practicing preventative medicine is the best way to avoid any major medical issues in the long run. Keeping your horse up to date on all vaccines is a necessary part of responsible horse ownership. Field trial horses travel frequently and all over the country. For this reason it is of the utmost importance that they are current on all vaccinations and also have a Coggins test performed at least once a year.



Horses that will be traveling a lot should be on a regular vaccination schedule. I personally vaccinate my horses in the spring and give boosters in the fall. This ensures that my horses are protected year-round. What vaccines you give your horse are just as important as when they are given. There are some vaccines that are optional and others that are necessary. Your veterinarian can help you determine what will be best for you and your horse, largely based on where you live and will be traveling.

The AVMA (American Veterinary Medical Association) defines core vaccinations as those "that protect from diseases that are endemic to a region, those with potential public health significance, required by law, virulent/highly infectious, and/or those posing a risk of severe disease. Core vaccines have clearly demonstrated efficacy and safety, and thus exhibit a high enough level of patient benefit and low enough level of risk to justify their use in the majority of patients."

Core vaccines for horses:

· Rabies · West Nile Virus

· Eastern/Western Equine Encephalomyelitis · Tetanus

Risk-based vaccinations are defined by the AAEP (American Association of Equine Practitioners) as "vaccinations included in a vaccination program after the performance of a risk-benefit analysis. The use of risk-based vaccinations may vary regionally, from population to population within an area, or between individual horses within a given population." It is important that a veterinarian be consulted regarding risk-based vaccinations.

Risk-based vaccines for horses:


· Anthrax · Equine Influenza

Botulism · Potomac Horse Fever

Equine Herpesvirus (Rhinopneumonitis) Rotaviral Diarrhea

· Equine Viral Arteritis · Strangles

When traveling with your horse, a current Coggins test is necessary. A Coggins test must have been performed within one year of the current date for it to be considered current. Some venues will require a test performed within six months. The Coggins test is a blood test for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) also known as Swamp Fever. There currently is not a vaccine available. The Coggins test has helped to greatly decrease the instances of EIA in the U.S.



EIA can be transmitted through blood, saliva, milk and body secretions. However, the most common form of transmission is through biting flies such as horse flies, deer flies and mosquitoes. Once a horse has become infected with EIA, it will always be a carrier much like HIV in humans. A horse that tests positive for EIA must be reported to federal authorities. Options for infected horses include sending the horse to a recognized research facility, branding the horse and quarantining it at least 200 yards from other horses for the rest of its life, and euthanizing the horse. Since very few quarantine facilities exist, infected horses are typically euthanized.

Having a complete and comprehensive vaccination program in place will help minimize your horse's risk of contracting very serious diseases, thus keeping him healthy longer. Be sure to consult a veterinarian regarding what vaccines will be best for your horse as they will depend on where you live and will be traveling. Remember that when it comes to vaccinations preventative treatment is always the best policy and always consult your veterinarian.





Purebred Dogs: The Next Endangered Species?

The National Animal Interest Alliance Annual Conference, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, November 11 – 12, 2011 (Part I of III)

The American Brittany Club would like to thank MS Milde for sharing her summary of the National Animal Interest Alliance Annual Conference held last November. The ABC is a regular contributor to N.A.I.A. and appreciate the work that Patti Strand and the organization do to promote the interests of animal owners throughout the United States. This summary will be presented in three parts during the upcoming issues of The American Brittany Magazine.

We also appreciate the Online Magazine Front and Finish for working with us to bring you MS Milde's articles where they are originally published.

The National Animal Interest Alliance (NAIA), a national organization formed in 1991 to build unity among the varied groups who live and work with animals, held its annual conference in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, on November 12 and 13, 2011. Titled "Purebred Dogs: The Next Endangered Species?," major themes of the 2011 Conference concerned current challenges and opportunities facing purebred dogs and their breeders. Diverse topics included the use of genetic concepts to breed better dogs; the importance of puppyhood in shaping our dogs' temperament; achieving healthy longevity in our dogs; Animal Rights strategies, and what we must do to become more successful in countering this extremist movement; a current review of several important legal concepts in animal law and legislation; trends in dog ownership, sheltering and rescue; and an examination of the "humane relocation" movement. Renowned speakers from various fields of veterinary medicine, animal sheltering, pet behavior counseling, animal law and legislation, and applied canine genetics gave presentations and answered audience questions. I was able to attend this conference through the generosity of my Parent Club, the Field Spaniel Society of America, for which I am the AKC Legislative Liaison, and I thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity I had to participate. The Conference was very well attended by fanciers from all over the U.S. and Canada, and in addition to the wealth of information provided, gave attendee s a valuable opportunity to meet and network with others of similar interests. This article gives an overview of some of the major ideas presented at the 2011 NAIA Conference.

Use of genetics and health testing in breeding programs The American Kennel Club's Canine Health Foundation and the Morris Animal Foundation are the two largest charities in the world funding veterinary research for our pets. Both of these are largely supported through the efforts of purebred pet owners. Breed Parent Clubs and purebred dog breeders are highly dedicated to improving the health of their breeds through selection of the best breeding candidates by use of various health screening tests to ensure healthy and long-lived offspring. Such health testing simply has not been done for randomly-produced shelter pets of uncertain background. Additionally, despite the Animal Rights assertions that mixed-breed dogs are "healthier", there is no proof that this is the case. In fact, "hybrid vigor", when applied to mixed-breed dogs and given as a reason by Animal Rights activists for their belief in mixed-breed superiority, is a complete misnomer since "hybrid vigor" could only exist if the dog was backcrossed to the wolf, from where our domestic dogs of today originate.

The use of genetics to breed better dogs was stressed in several presentations. Matthew Ellinwood DVM, PhD discussed the application of inbreeding coefficients to prevent genetic disease in our breeds. Inbreeding, defined as the breeding of closely related individuals, is important in the development of purebred dog breeds, although it can lead to "popular sire syndrome" and "founder effects" as consequences. Inbreeding concentrates both harmful and desired alleles in the population, and can also cause "inbreeding depression effect" in the offspring (poor fertility, small litter size, and lowered immunity.) The "Inbreeding Coefficient" is a measure of the relatedness of a sire and a dam. A mating of a highly inbred brother and sister over 20 generations would give an inbreeding coefficient of 1.0, while a mating of completely unrelated dogs (outcrossing) would give an inbreeding coefficient of 0.0. While inbreeding coefficients are generally used to control the frequency and expression of autosomal recessive mutations in a population, they are also somewhat effective in controlling the expression of harmful polygenicrelated traits, as well, such as hip dysplasia. It is important to note that inbreeding does not create mutations de novo, but rather may increase the rate at which existing mutations and their expressed traits appear in a population. Some ancient deleterious mutations are found across many breeds and cannot be limited by restricting inbreeding. However, more recent mutations, such as those that have appeared in one breed or in only several breeds, can be controlled and reduced in incidence by lowering inbreeding coefficients. A good rule of thumb is to limit the inbreeding coefficient for a breeding to not more than about 0.125. An example of a 0.125

inbreeding coefficient would be given by a breeding between an aunt or uncle and a nephew or niece. However, this number can safely go higher in one breeding if outcrossing is used in the succeeding generation.

Dr. Ellinwood's presentation was followed by that of Dr. Frances Smith, DVM, PhD, current President of the Orthopedic Foundation for Animals (OFA) and who is herself a breeder (Labrador Retrievers). Smith stressed the importance of breed health surveys for gathering information about specific veterinary challenges faced by that breed. Genetic testing is successfully used to screen for a number of deleterious alleles in various breeds, and is particularly useful for diseases based on autosomal recessive mutations. Phenotypic testing, such as x-ray review for canine hip dysplasia, is used for polygenic disorders, and while not as exact as genetic testing, has still proven very valuable in reducing the incidences of these conditions, as well. She explained that canine genetic tests are typically developed in response to breeder requests, and very rigorous standards are used to validate the test and publish the research results before a test can be put into practice. While genetic-based disease comprises about 25% of all canine disease, Smith believes the incidence of many genetic diseases in the dog can be reduced through proper use of various genetic and phenotypic screening tests, as well as the careful examination of both vertical and horizontal pedigrees of the potential breeding stock.


Paul Mandell, National Director for Canine Programs, Canine Companions for Independence, described the tools used by his organization in service dog breeding colonies to maintain genetic diversity while breeding for specific desired traits. In order to be successful in their work, service dogs must be physically and mentally sound; of the appropriate size; long-lived; and behaviorally suitable for their tasks, such as adaptable to change, and readily tolerating a wide range of environments. In order to ensure these characteristics, most of the dogs used in their service dog program are from their own breeding colony. To guarantee the continuation of desired traits in this program, Canine Companions for Independence uses a calculation termed Estimated Breeding Value, an objective measure of the relative genetic value of each member in a breeding population in relation to one desired trait. Using matrix algebra, calculations can be combined for several beneficial traits to determine the best dogs in the breeding colony overall. Additional strategies to minimize the harmful effects of inbreeding include limiting the number of times a particular animal is bred; maintaining outbred subpopulations for breeding purposes; the maximization of hererozygosity as a goal; employing coefficients of coancestry for all dogs/ bitches in the breeding pool; and use of DNA markers and other genetic testing to limit the expression of harmful hereditary conditions.

TRAININ' DOGS

with Rick Smith

THE HONOR SYSTEM

Just in case you're wondering, this column is not going to cover remembering to put your money in the coffee and doughnut fund jar at work (although if you're supposed to be paying your share, we do think you should ante up). This column is about honoring as it relates to bird dogs.

There are few sights finer than walking over a ridge and finding a high-headed, 10 o'clock-tailed (insert your favored breed and color here) locked up tight on a perfect point, directing you to the bird with eyes and nose so intense they could burn right through the cover.

The only thing that could make a scene like this any more complete is to see your own young dog come around the corner well behind the first dog and then freeze in mid-stride in a mirror image of the dog already pointing. To watch a brace of bird dogs work together and display teamwork like this is an awe inspiring display of the instincts our dogs are born with.

Honoring or backing is a valued and

much admired tradition in bird dogs. While it is a beautiful sight, we'd like to emphasize that it is not strictly a manmade or trained reaction. Backing is an essential part of the teamwork a pack of wild dogs must use to survive. If an overeager young pup can't contain itself and breaks in ahead of the dog already stalking the game, chances are good that the game will escape. If wild dogs don't work together, their pack doesn't eat much.

The terms "honoring" and "backing" come from this concept, and are simply a definition of what the other dogs do when they see a pack member in the process of stalking game. The lead dog has identified the game by scent and/or sight. The other dogs "honor" the face that a dog has found game, and they "back" that dog so as to be available to help the game from escaping as the lead dog moves in.

Do all dogs have this instinct? To some degree, yes. And if they were running with a pack of dogs that had to





kill to eat, they'd learn the rest of it pretty quickly, or else be killed or ostracized by the rest of the pack. Since our bird dogs aren't members of a wild pack, the teaching falls to us as trainers and owners.

Backing in a bird dog hunting situation is done strictly on sight. While occasionally a back dog may catch scent as well, the real honor comes from stopping at the first sight of another dog on point. Many dogs will display this behavior with very little training, and all you have to do is reinforce it and enhance what the dog is already doing. If your dog doesn't seem to want to back, it boils down to one of two things: competition and/or jealousy, or the dog just doesn't understand what to do.

A dog that consistently rushes ahead of another dog on point and busts the birds is showing jealousy. This comes from a desire to show dominance as well as a strong prey drive. Conversely, a dog that just doesn't understand the concept of honoring will run through the pointing dog's birds a few times before realizing that when another dog is on point, there are probably birds out there. Sometimes they will grasp the idea with very little help, and sometimes we will need to train the dog to back.





How do we teach a dog to back? If you will recall, in previous columns we've said that all training problems trace to one of three things: The dog isn't coming to you, going with you, or standing still. In the case of a dog refusing to honor, it is refusing to stand still. Before we can realistically expect a dog to back, we've got to make sure it has been trained to stand still. This training goes back to the basic foundation training: going from standing still on the chain gang to "sacking out" the dog on the table, then the checkcord work on kneeling beside your dog, with your arm over its back supporting the flank as it scents a bird, then through the "whoa" post training and overlaying the e-collar.

All of this training teaches a dog to stand still when we ask it to, and this concept can be transferred to any situation where we want the dog to be still. What we don't do is teach a dog to back another on voice command. It has to happen on sight. If you've got to holler at your dog to stop, the birds are probably going to be long gone. And, if you have to tell your dog to stop, how many times is he busting birds you don't see?

As we describe the training that goes into teaching dogs to back, we must emphasize this: Whenever you're working on teaching a dog to back, there must always, without fail, be a bird out in front of the dog that's pointing. The more success you can give your dog, the more easily it will understand what you expect. If there is always a bird to be found out in front of a dog on point, your dog will form a habit of stopping because there's always a bird in front of another dog on point.

Another added benefit of training your dog to back is that it is easier to teach a dog to be steady to wind and shot while backing. This works because the backing dog is farther away from the birds and the temptation. Using the backing training to steady a dog is great practice, and is easier than doing it alone. Training a dog to be steady is the uninstinctive part of the process, so any way we can use to

make it simpler for the dog is a good thing.

If you've got a friend you can train with, you can plant hobbled birds or use remote launchers in a field, then checkcord the dogs into the scent of the birds. Take turns being in the front, or pointing, position so both dogs have equal opportunity to point and back. When the front dog points, the backing dog should stop as soon as it sees the other dog. As you do this drill, be sure to stay well behind the front do so your dog learns to stop on sight rather than scent.

If you're working too close together, the possibility exists that your dog will scent the bird. Ideally, let the dog that will be pointing go

out to quarter on the checkcord first. Once that dog has made game and is on point, bring the honoring dog around and in upwind of the bird so it will be less likely to catch scent, which in turn gives you the opportunity to stop the dog when it first catches sight of the pointing dog.

There is a good reason why we want the backing dog to stop well out and away from the dog on point. If you are in a hunting situation, it's possible that there may be more than one bird, and you don't want the second dog to accidentally flush birds by encroaching on the pointing dog.

What if you are training by yourself? You can create the illusion of a pointing dog with a silhouette make of wood and staked to the ground so it will stand upright. Another option is what is called an Auto-Backer, which is a silhouette that can be electronically raised and lowered via remote control (an article about the Auto-Backer and its use appeared in the March/April 2004 issue). Either way will work, as long as you stop your

will work, as long as you stop your dog as soon as you are certain your dog has seen the "pointing" dog. The electronic units are handy since they can be kept in a lowered position and used in less dense cover. By raising the silhouette as your dog gets into position to be able to see it, you can control the situation better, and you can also have the pointing dog "disappear" after the bird flushes.

When you stop your dog once it has seen the backing dog, act just like your dog were on point. Work your way up the checkcord and kneel down beside the dog, with one hand holding the collar while the other goes over the dog's back and supports the dog's flank with that hand. As soon as your dog is being held steady, launch or flush the bird. Once the bird has flown, move your

dog out and quarter away from that spot.

Often, a competitive, dominant type of dog will learn to "blink" the pointing dog or silhouette. This means they covertly glance that way but pretend to not see it, because they don't want to be second in line. You'll have to really pay attention to this, as a quick glance is easy to miss and dogs can be really smart about pretending to not see the other dog. Set your dog up so there can be no question of its seeing the pointing dog, and be sure to stop it when you know it has had an opportunity to see, yet chosen not to honor.

Again, having a bird to launch is important here, especially if you have remote launchers to use. If your dog blinks the pointing dog, you can launch the bird, which will take the reward away from the dog that blinked.

If you can run a young dog with an older, well-trained dog, pups will often learn to honor in that situation because the older dog finds birds. It's important

to make sure that the young dog isn't confined to the role of backing only; it isn't good for their confidence level, and they learn to let the other dog do all the bird-finding. Once they've got the idea, stop running them with the older dog until they've gained confidence and are finding birds on their own.

If you're doing any kind of competition, backing is important. While you aren't like to win anything on honoring alone, if your dog doesn't back, you can lose it all.

Why all the fuss about honoring? Anything the dog does that costs you a shot is something the dog is not supposed to do. If they bust another dog's birds, you're not going to get a shot. The dog that found the birds is entitled to the retrieve when you do shoot, and a dog that won't back reliably can mess that up by stealing the retrieve. Honoring is not just good instincts, it's good manners – and it's an extra little bit of sparkle and polish for the ultimate brag dog.

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
