Issues and Opportunities, September, 2012

I would like to return to a topic covered in an earlier column, namely the future of the American Brittany Club. By that, I am including young people and young dogs. First, the young people. I was in my early 40s when I got my first Brittany and both my children had left home and were in college. Consequently, I did not participate in any of the Junior Handler activities of the ABC with either child. My daughter, however, had been active in 4H with her horse, so I know how important such activities are in the development of young people. I am pleased that there are currently several Junior Handlers participating in both AKC show and field activities with their dogs. ABC has a program by which we attempt to show our support and appreciation for these juniors by keeping track of their accomplishments during the year and recognizing them at the National Specialty Show each November. This was a relatively straightforward task when AKC published those results in the Gazette, but it has become more difficult to extract that information in the past few years. Nonetheless, we do want to continue this program, so I am asking for help from the membership. If you are in Junior Showmanship, or are the parent of someone in Junior Showmanship, or if you know someone in Junior Showmanship, PLEASE contact Beth Rosener and let her know. She discovered the final standings for the Juniors in 2011 almost by accident as AKC stopped sending them out automatically. Beth's contact information can be found on the ABC website under "Committees." She will give you further instructions on the kind of information she would like from you for her records.

One of the things Beth told me is that her daughter, Brittany, was awarded a \$2000 scholarship by AKC for her participation in this program. Brittany also won a \$1000 scholarship from the Central Ohio Kennel Club. These scholarships will help Brittany with her studies at Clemson University in the field of genetics. Congratulations Brittany! We are all very proud of you. And if there are other scholarship winners out there, please let us know so we can recognize your accomplishments too.

The other component of the future of ABC is the dogs we breed. One of the venues in which these young dogs are evaluated is the Futurity program. As I mentioned in a previous column, there is concern because the level of interest in the Futurities seems to be slipping somewhat. Conversations with a number of people strongly suggest that much of this is the result of the cessation of the National Futurity Runoff, previously held on the weekend between the National Amateur Championship and the National Open Championship. An informal poll I have taken shows strong support to reinstate this National event. I would be very much in favor of doing that, but, as the old saying goes, the devil is in the details. However, I believe that if there is sufficient support from the membership, the details can be worked out.

The Futurities have historically been run with support by the American Field, using their procedures. However, many of the dogs that have been entered in the recent Futurities are not registered in the Field Dog Stud Book, maintained by the American Field. This has led to some discussion as to whether the American Field will continue to provide the level of support in the future as it has in the past. American Field has been a strong supporter of ABC, recognizing our National Championships and Classics as American Field Championships. Several Brittany clubs also sponsor regional AFTCA Championships, which are run under American Field rules. I know many of our members register their dogs with both AKC and FDSB; I would encourage all of you who compete in the field events to do so. In an age when there are groups who would take away the rights of people to own and hunt dogs, we need to show our support for all the organizations that have supported us.

TRAININ' DOGS with Rick Smith

HUNTING TRAINED AND UNTRAINED DOGS TOGETHER

Here's the scenario: There's a new guy at work, and in conversation, you mention you hunt and have a dog. Eagerly, your new friend announces that he has a dog, too, and maybe the two of you could go hunting together sometime. Sounds great! This could be the start of a great friendship and give you a new hunting companion; or it could be a total wreck just looking for a place to happen. Why?

Let's carry the scene further and let it play out a few different ways. All the scenes start the same way: the two of you set a time and date to hunt, and arrive at the designated place. What happens next? Well, one possibility is that your friend's dog is well-trained, able to honor and back as well as handle just as well as your dog, and the two of you have a great outing. That's the ending we all hope for. Unfortunately, it doesn't always happen this way.

First, we need to define trained and untrained. A completely trained dog is steady to wing, shot, and kill, and will hold until released. An untrained dog is out of control. Out of control is a nuisance, because it will cost you shots, and anything that costs you a shot is something the dog shouldn't have done. There are levels in the middle, such as the dog that is steady to wing but breaks on shot or kill, and this adds even more to the mix.

So what can happen if you put the two

together? It depends on the situation. First of all, much depends on the pecking order. If you are running an older dog with a young dog and they know each other well, the pecking order is already established. If the two dogs are total strangers to each other, it will take some time to work out which dog is dominant, and that can continue through into hunting as they try to work out who is in charge. Depending on the personalities of the two dogs, this can result in a fight, one dog being so totally submissive that it won't leave your side, or any combination in between. Even on the breakaway, if you turn an unfocused/untrained dog loose with a trained/focused dog, lots of times they'll both lose focus because they're paying more attention to working out the pecking order.

Trained dogs run for a purpose. It's a pack purpose, and they are working for the handler. Untrained dogs run for their own purpose and do not recognize the handler as the pack leader. A trained dog will run with the focus on finding birds, while an untrained dog will be unfocused, running and hunting for anything and everything. This usually results in the untrained dog stumbling over all sorts of stuff, from offgame to busting birds. Remember, anything that costs you a shot is a no-no.

How can this affect a trained dog? Again, it depends on the situation. If the

untrained dog finds birds, runs through them, and chases them off, all in plain sight of the trained dog, then the trained dog, seeing no correction forthcoming from the handler, decides to join in the fun because it must be okay. This confuses the pecking order and takes some control away from the trained dog's handler.

Think back to when you were small. When you went with your parents to visit friends, weren't there some things their kids did that you knew you shouldn't? And if your parents weren't watching, didn't you join in the forbidden behavior, too?

Bird dogs are pretty much the same. In this particular situation where the untrained, out-of-control dog is busting and chasing birds and most everything else in its path, it takes an older, seasoned dog to be able to handle the pressure and keep its composure. The mature dog of perhaps eight to 10 years and up is likely to be less ambitious and more settled in its routine. A younger dog, let's say three or four years or so, is much less likely to be able to handle the chaos of being hunted with an out-ofcontrol dog and is probably going to come unglued. It's just too tempting.

Different scenario: The two dogs know each other, and the young dog respects the trained older dog as its leader. A young dog can learn a lot from an older dog, if the young dog is compliant and paying attention. This can be helpful in a backing situation since the pecking order is already established. A young dog will learn to back more quickly with an older dog since the older dog knows how to find birds. If there's more action, there's more opportunity to learn, and the experienced, trained dog can provide that action.

On the flip side, hunting these two together too often can result in the untrained dog learning to rely too heavily on the older dog to find all the birds, becoming what we call a "me-too dog" that learns to back but not find birds. This deprives the younger dog of the independence it needs. What to do? Let the young dog learn from the older dog, but also hunt the young dog alone as much as possible. If the inexperienced younger dog is an alpha personality, it is likely to let the older, experienced dog do the work of locating the birds - so the young dog can jump in and punch them out! Again, let common sense be your guide and stop this before it starts. If the younger dog is submissive to the older dog, it may just trail along behind and not want to take any initiative to find birds on its own.

A trained dog doesn't require much in the way of direction from the handler in the field. It will work within range, using the cover and objectives to advantage, without having to be constantly guided. The untrained dog, however, is probably getting hollered at a lot. All that this shouting and yelling does is frustrate the older dog, and in self-defense, it will tune out everything, including its handler.

In other words, if your buddy wants to hunt his untrained dog with yours, do yourself a favor and don't turn 'em loose to hunt together. Let the untrained dog have a turn to hunt, but hunt them one at a time; to do otherwise can cause big problems for the trained dog. Turning them loose one at a time will eliminate much of the confusion and lessen the damage it can do to the trained dog.

The trained dog has a find, makes a stylish point, and is rock solid steady to the wing, shot, and fall. The out of control, untrained dog breaks, rushes in and steals the retrieve. What does this do? It deprives the trained dog of its reward, the retrieve. It also takes some of the trained dog's desire to work for you away, since the other dog got the reward/retrieve – for misbehaving.

To take this scene a step further, what if both dogs go for the retrieve? It is entirely possible that you'll end up with a tug-ofwar between the two dogs, and you can end up with two dogs with hardmouth problems developed from the competition. The trained dog that pointed the bird should get the retrieve. It's the reward for a job wellA nice situation of working two dogs together! The bird is flushing, the handler is walking up, and both dogs are handling this very nicely.



done.

There are times when a little competition can be a good thing, but be careful about letting it get out of hand. If an older dog jumps on a pup to argue over a bird, it can spook the pup off birds. Be very careful of doing anything that could potentially make a young dog bird shy.

Okay, we're back at the truck getting ready for our first hunt with our new friends and his dog. How do you handle the situation so everyone comes out a winner? You can get a good idea of how well-trained a dog is by how well it handles around the vehicle. Is it patient and quiet, or is it pawing frantically at the crate door and whining? Does it pull when on a lead, or does it respect its handler? What a dog shows you here is usually what it will take with it to the field. If it's out of control at the truck, things are probably not going to improve during the hunt.

The best plan is to suggest turning the dogs loose one at a time to save their energy and make the hunt last longer. This will give you a chance to see how the other dog works and you can make further hunting decisions from there. It doesn't matter which dogs works first, and hopefully all will go well with all dogs being reasonably well-trained. Maybe your friend's dog is young and well-started, but not finished. Find out what the dog knows and where it's at in training, then make a judgment call on whether or not to hunt the young dog with yours. If things go south, you can always pick your dog up and stop any problems before they get worse.

Suppose your friend's dog is not trained

and is an out-of-control nuisance – how do you handle that? Good sportsmanship comes into play here. If the dog is running willy-nilly and busting birds, don't shoot. It is possible that the new guy may not care that he screamed his lungs out all day trying to control his unfocused, untrained dog and didn't get many shooting opportunities.

These dogs are learning while on the chain as a group. The auto-backer rises, a bird is released, and the dogs must accept their position as backing/honoring.





That's his choice. Your choice has to do with your dog and what is in the best interest of preserving the long hours of training you've put into it. Let your friend learn from experience and from watching a trained dog perform. They

best way to prove to someone the value of a well-trained dog is to let him hunt over it. The thrill of watching a good bird dog do its job is enough to make most anybody covet a brag dog like that. The more shooting a good dog provides through being well-trained, the more that dog will get to go hunting, and the more you will want to take that dog hunting. At this point, it's easy to discuss training and maybe even offer to help. This could be just what your new friend was hoping for, and you have a chance to be a mentor.



JUDGING PUPPY STAKES

"Howdy," Bobby White said when I walked in the clubhouse at Hoffman. NC. It was 7 o'clock in the morning. I had seen Bobby White's picture in the Field enough times so I recognized him. He was sitting near the oil heater at a long gray table drinking coffee from a Styrofoam cup and talking to the field trial secretary for Tarheel Brittany Club's January trial. Bobby was small and wiry and looked older than his seventy-five years. He stood up and shook my hand. "I understand we're judging a puppy stake together," he said.

"Yes," I replied, "Nice to meet you."

That was an understatement. I had been really excited when I found out that I was judging with Bobby White. He had bred some of the top pointers in the south, and I was hoping he would give me a lesson in what he looked for in a puppy.

Many field trialers including me believe puppy stakes are the most subjective stakes to judge because you are judging potential. It is not about what you see in front of you so much as what you imagine that puppy will become. And then there is the business of personal preference. Some judges look for all-age potential while other judges look for the puppy they want to take home. Bobby White had a very successful breeding program so it was obvious that he knew how to evaluate puppies.

The secretary gave us our judges' books and told us the puppy stake was breaking away from behind the barn at 8 o'clock. We parted ways to saddle our horses and met again at the breakaway a few minutes before handlers brought their



puppies to the line. I asked Bobby if he judged many puppy stakes.

"I judge my own pups every time I take them out," he said with a grin, "but I don't get to judge many puppy stakes. They don't run pups much in American Field. I don't care if it's a Brittany or a pointer pup, I'm looking for the same thing. I'm looking for a future champion."

Bobby asked handlers if they were ready, and we checked our watches. Bobby had top dog which was a small orange female, and I had bottom dog which was a big roan male. Both puppies raced down the path almost out of sight. Just before they disappeared I saw the roan puppy break off to the left.

"Watch that pup,' Bobby said pointing at the roan one. "He's starting to hunt. See how he's using the wind. He's hunting. You can't teach that. First and foremost a pup has to hunt."

The orange female had disappeared over the horizon and was now coming back up the path. She got to where she could see her handler and took off again.

"Man, she's fast," I remarked.

"Yeah," Bobby said, but she's not

applying herself. She's running, but she has no purpose."

The roan pup was starting to make some big casts. He was bold and at times busted through cover without hesitation. We called time at 20 minutes and waited for handlers to round up their charges. The roan puppy was coming to his handler and looked real pleased with himself. The female was still running around and did not want to be caught.

"Look at that," Bobby said looking at the roan puppy. "He wants to run but he also wants to listen."

Second brace was wild. Handlers screamed and yelled as both puppies ran forward, behind, in the woods, everywhere. At one point Bobby, looking bored, turned to me and said, "Front running dogs are bred."

Third brace Bobby had a nicely built orange female, and I had a smaller male. These puppies raced down the path, and when the female broke off, the male followed tagging her for the next ten minutes.

"Gotta be careful to determine which pup is at fault," Bobby remarked. "Sometimes both pups contribute to the problem.



wind. That's ok with me. I don't want to see a lot of straight line running in a pup. I want to see him hunting his way forward."

We were both watching the male when he made a big move to the front that carried him to the far end of the long field. We could barely make him out when he skidded to a stop and swelled into a statue. His handler galloped toward him and a bird lifted. Then the rest of the covey flushed, and he was in hot pursuit. We called time.

"Don't get much Bobby said. "That's a

better than that," Bobby said. "That's a future champion right there."

I got my book out and wrote down placements. We used the brace-mate for second and placed the roan dog third. The female with the attractive gait from the third brace placed fourth.

We rode in and stopped at Bobby's trailer. He dismounted. I told him I would take the placements to the field trial secretary, and he said he appreciated that since he was a little tired. He shook my hand again, and I told him how much I had enjoyed it.

"I saw some nice pups this morning," Bobby said. "A lot of people have a hard time evaluating pups because they don't know what to look for, but it's common sense. A pup's gotta hunt if he's going to find birds, and he better hunt in front of me not behind me. He's gotta be gaited right if he's going to run an hour. And he's gotta have style because if he don't, I ain't interested in looking at him. It's as simple as that. Now a good trainer can make a sorry pup into a weekend winner, but I'm looking for a pup that's bred to be a champion. Then I don't have to do a lot of training to make him into something he ain't. Heck, you just have to polish the good ones."

Sometimes a pup becomes a real good head trailer and is actually keeping in front of the rear pup making him look like the culprit. See there," he said pointing. "The rear pup lost sight of the forward pup, and he's dropping his head to track her. He's the offender not her."

The female was opening up now that she was by herself, and she was doing a beautiful job covering the ground and staying forward.

"Look at her gait," Bobby said. "A lot of Brittanys have a choppy gait. The front end comes up and then the rear end comes up. Look at her. Her back stays level. Man, that's pretty. Looks like she's floating. She's put together right to run an hour."

Now Bobby pointed at the smaller male. "See why the female left him in the dust. He can't keep up with her because he's moving like a seesaw."

Third brace ran short and hunted laterally. Fourth brace got into sand spurs and both puppies quit.

So far we had the roan puppy first. He showed desire to hunt as well as run. The female from third brace was second. She ran shorter but was real attractive on the ground with a nice forward pattern.

Fifth brace was the last brace. Bobby

had the big liver male, and I had the smaller white female. The big male was eye-catching with lofty style that was undeniable even at his young age. Upon being released, both puppies raced to the front and disappeared. Next time we saw them they had separated and were hunting hard. The female was light on her feet and soared across the ground with effortless grace. She was making some big casts to birdy objectives, and each move was determined by the wind, yet she managed to always turn to the front.

"Look at her," Bobby said. "That bitch runs with her nose. Ain't that a beautiful sight! Dogs like her will always find birds."

I was having a hard time taking my eyes off the big male. Where the female was a ballerina, he was a freight train building speed as he ran. He had a powerful stride that ate up the ground. He crossed in front of us tail high and cracking. When Bobby saw that, he laughed and said, "Look at him cracking that little stub. He sure is pretty and he knows it."

The male was making big sweeping casts in some fields but having trouble handling other fields.

"You notice that," Bobby asked me? "He's all natural. He's quartering that field because he don't want to run into the

INVITATIONS

Jake Sarver sat at the kitchen table and cleaned the single-shot .410. Whip, a field-trial pointer, white with gold ears and mask, lay on the cracked linoleum, jaws on paws, and watched him.

Jake recalled the day his wife, Mary, had painted the battered stock of the little gun blaze orange so he wouldn't lose it when he lay it down to correct a dog. A wave of sadness passed through him. Whip, sensing his mood, rose and lay his head on Jake's knee.

Jake returned the cleaning gear to the kit box, snapped barrel to stock, replace the foreman.

"Let's go to bed, Whip."

The phone's first ring jarred Jake from sleep; on the darkness he fumbled for the receiver.

"Hello."

"Jake, they've scratched Miss Lydia—she's in season. Whip is in! Get on the road man—you can just make it."

"Okay. I'll call you from the road."

Jake turned on the lamp, sat on the edge of the bed to gather his senses. Could it be true? Whip in the Invitational, the trial for the year's twelve best dogs? Yes, it was true! Whip's record placed him thirteenth, and by the rules of the Invitational a scratch moved him up. Jake and Whip's owner, Otto Martin, the caller, had shared a dark joke about thirteen being their unlucky number. Not anymore.

The Invitational's format was ingenious, simple, grueling. The fairest test for pointing dogs—and the toughest—ever devised. The twelve dogs ran in hour braces the first day, then another hour the second day. On the third day, as many as the judges selected came back for two-hour final heats. A winner and sometimes a runner-up were named, considering the three days' work.

Whip stood beside the bed and stared into Jake's sleep-filled eyes. The big pointer sensed they would soon be on the road. Jake looked at the alarm clock: midnight, Thanksgiving day. The Invitational would begin at eight on Saturday morning.

In the kitchen Jake put on a pot of coffee and opened the road atlas. He had never run at Paducah. He'd heard the grounds were gently rolling, big open fields between patches of hardwood forest, not many quail these days, but enough for a dog that could cover country and dig 'em up. Whip could do that—if he found birds in his first twenty minutes. If not, he would likely take the bit and be gone. Whip was a dog that did not look back, a front running dog, obsessed with finding birds. Appreciated by those who saw his type as the ideal, deplored by those who looked first for subservience. Fortunately for Whip and Jake, Otto Martin was a lover of the kind "that run off...but not quite." With Whip there were those who said "not quite" did not apply, that he was an outlaw.

In truth, Whip was a paradox. Jake could hunt him on foot and never lose him, like a meat dog. But when Whip came to the line at a trial and saw Jake on horseback and a gallery behind him, Whip absorbed the excitement and set his mind to run. And run he would, as far and as fast as his long supple legs would carry him, until he disappeared for the day or the scent of game birds came to his nostrils. Then and only then would he become a statue, and stay one until Jake or the scout found him pointing, and Jake flushed the quarry and fired the blank and released him to hunt on for more.

Sometimes Whip found birds, but no one found Whip. It was so easy to override a dog on point, especially a dog that hunted so much country, whose bird sense made him dig into cover when birds were not feeding out on the edges. When this happened, Whip's detractors said he was a run off. But Jake knew Whip, and when Whip didn't show to the front, Jake had confidence Whip was pointing somewhere. That was when Jake really missed Mary, his wife and his scout, gone now almost a year....

Jake traced the route to Paducah in the atlas and added up the miles. It was north of Memphis, where the Tennessee and Ohio Rivers converge. He could make it if he left soon and drove straight through. He was wide awake now, the depression completely gone for the first time in months. He threw underwear, socks, shirts, jeans and boots into his duffel, brushed his teeth, threw in the dop kit, ran through a mental checklist of things he would need, most of them already in the horse trailer or the truck. He finished his cup of coffee, ate an apple, poured the remaining coffee in a thermos for the road. Going to the stable, he whistled for the horses. They came running from the paddock. He tethered the four, gave each a quick brushing. He backed the old truck under the trailer's gooseneck, lowered the trailer onto the coupling, connected the wires for running lights and brakes, attached the safety chains. He brought from the kennel two derbies and two all-age dogs—all that was left of his field-trial string besides Whip—and put them in compartments in the trailer. (He would enter them in the Kentucky Classic following the Invitational.) With a flashlight, he checked the trailer's tack room for rain gear, horse and dog feed, saddles and tack, feed pans. He saw the empty saddle scabbard, remembered the .410 on the kitchen table, and gathered it.

Whip jumped to his place on the seat; Jake turned the key; the engine erupted; they eased down the lane, bound for Paducah. It was 1:00 a.m.

At an all-night convenience store, Jake filled the double gas tanks, checked the air in the tires and bought a case of cheap 30-weight oil. He held his breath as the attendant put through his credit card. After an interminable silence, the cash register whirred, and the charge went through. He wondered what would happen next time.

He pushed the button to reset the trip meter, and four zeros lined up. Above it the meter read 280,563 miles. How many more could the truck take? And could he stay awake...? Then he remembered how he and Mary had alternated three-hour driving shifts, and how quickly the miles and hours had passed for them.

As the sky lightened, Whip woke and rose to his haunches. His eyes scanned the sky. He locked on to a soaring buzzard and stared at it until it disappeared from view. He barked at hawks perched in hardwoods along the roadside. Later, he lay down in the seat and rested his jaws in Jake's lap. A tear struck the top of his nose; he licked it and peered up into Jake's eyes. Jake touched his silky ears and stroked his flanks, felt the iron hard muscle of his hindquarters, sweet talked him.

Every hundred miles, Jake stopped to add a quart of oil to the truck's smoking engine. Every two hundred, he let the dogs out on check cord to empty. Each time he bought gas he held his breath until the credit card cleared. He prayed silently that the truck and the tires would hold out. At midnight Friday, he called Otto in Paducah. "Jake drew the first brace," Otto said. "I'll make it," said Jake.

He finally reached the Day's Inn at Paducah at 4:30 Saturday morning. Dually pickups filled the lot, some fancy and new, many old and beat-up like his. The night clerk connected him on a house phone to Otto's room.

"Who'd you find to scout for us?" Jake asked as he entered Otto's room. Otto ducked into the bathroom.

"You look awful. Catch forty winks. Then we'll get breakfast."

Otto had called him every day since he came home from the hospital. He had not had a drink, but it was one day at a time....

At 7:55 a.m., Jake rode for the breakaway, Whip pulling anxiously ahead on the check cord, the two extra horses following in tow. A hundred riders waited, their mounts nervous and steaming in the chill air. As he approached, the gallery riders parted to let him through. He heard murmurs of good luck. Then came the adrenalin rush.

Out front were the judges, and beside their horses he could see the big Stetson of Whip's owner. Beside him stood a small person, a child—no, a woman—Mary! She smiled and reached for Whip's collar and the reins of her horse.

"Are you ready gentleman.... All right, let 'em go." The senior judge punched his stopwatch. Mary released Whip, swung easily into the saddle, and at the scream of the handlers' whistles, the field-trial party set off like a cavalry troop behind Whip and his bracemate, sprinting for the horizon.



Developing High Achievers – Part One

Man for centuries has tried various methods to improve performance. Some of the methods have stood the test of time, others have not. Those who first conducted research on this topic believed that the period of early age was a most important time for stimulation because of its rapid growth and development. Today, we know that early life is a time when the physical immaturity of an organism is susceptible and responsive to a restricted but important class of stimuli. Because of its importance many studies have focused their efforts on the first few months of life.

Newborn pups are uniquely different than adults in several respects. When born their eyes are closed and their digestive system has a limited capacity requiring periodic stimulation by their dam who routinely licks them in order to promote digestion. At this age they are only able to smell, suck, and crawl. Body temperature is maintained by snuggling close to their mother or by crawling into piles with other littermates. During these first few weeks of immobility researchers noted that these immature and underdeveloped canines are sensitive to a restricted class of stimuli which includes thermal, and tactile stimulation, motion and locomotion.

Other mammals such as mice and rats are also born with limitations and they also have been found to demonstrate a similar sensitivity to the effects of early stimulation. Studies show that removing them from their nest for three minutes each day during the first five to ten days of life causes body temperatures to fall below normal. This mild form of stress is sufficient to stimulate hormonal, adrenal and pituitary systems. When tested later as adults, these same animals were better able to withstand stress than littermates who were not exposed to the same early stress exercises. As adults, they responded to stress in "a graded" fashion, while their nonstressed littermates responded in an "all or nothing way."

Data involving laboratory mice and rats also shows that stress in small amounts can produce adults who respond maximally. On the other hand, the results gathered from non-stressed littermate show that they become easily exhausted and would near death if exposed to intense prolonged stress. When tied down so they were unable to move for twenty-four hours, rats developed severe stomach ulcer, but litter mates exposed to early stress handling were found to be more resistant to stress tests and did not show evidence of ulcers. A secondary affect was also noticed.

Sexual maturity was attained sooner in the littermates given early stress exercises. When tested for differences in health and disease, the stress animals were found to be more resistant to certain forms of cancer and infectious diseases and could withstand terminal starvation and exposure to cold for longer periods than their non-stress littermates. Other studies involving early stimulation exercises have been successfully performed on both cats and dogs. In these studies, the Electrical Encephalogram (EEG) was found to be ideal for measuring the electrical activity in the brain because of its extreme sensitivity to changes in excitement, emotional stress, muscle tension, changes in oxygen and breathing. EEG measures show that pups and kittens when given early stimulation exercises mature at faster rates and perform better in certain problem solving tests than nonstimulated mates. In the higher level animals the effect of early stimulation exercises have also been studied. The use of surrogate mothers and familiar objects were tested by both of the Kelloggs' and Dr. Yearkes using young chimpanzees. Their pioneer

research shows that the more primates were deprived of stimulation and interaction during early development, the less able they were to cope, adjust and later adapt to situations as adults.

While experiments have not yet produced specific information about the optimal amounts of stress needed to make young animals psychologically or physiologically superior, researches agree that stress has value. What also is known is that a certain amount of stress for one may be too intense for another, and that too much stress can retard development. The results show that early stimulation exercises can have positive results but must be used with caution. In other words, too much stress can cause pathological adversities rather than physical or psychological superiority.

Methods of Stimulation

The U.S. Military in their canine program developed a method that still serves as a guide to what works. In an effort to improve the performance of dogs used for military purposes, a program called "Bio Sensor" was developed. Later, it became known to the public as the "Super Dog" Program. Based on years of research, the military learned that early neurological stimulation exercises could have important and lasting effects. Their studies confirmed that there are specific time periods early in life when neurological stimulation has optimum results. The first period involves a window of time that begins at the third day of life and lasts until the sixteenth day. It is believed that because this interval of time is a period of rapid

neurological growth and development, and therefore is of great importance to the individual.

T h e "Bio Sensor" program was also concerned with early neurological stimulation in order to give the dog a superior advantage. Its development utilized six exercises which were designed to stimulate the neurological system. Each workout involved handling puppies once each day. The workouts required

handling them one at a time while performing a series of five exercises. Listed in order of preference the handler starts with one pup and stimulates it using each of the five exercises. The handler completes the series from beginning to end before starting with the next pup. The handling of each pup once per day involves the following exercises:

Tactical Stimulation (between toes) – Holding the pup in one hand, the handler gently stimulates (tickles) the pup between the toes on any one foot using a Q-tip. It is not necessary to see that the pup is feeling the tickle. Time of stimulation 3-5 seconds.

Head held erect – Using both hands, the pup is held perpendicular to the ground, (straight up), so that its head is directly above its tail. This is an upwards position. Time of stimulation 3-5 seconds.

Head pointed down – Holding the pup firmly with both hands the head is reversed and is pointed downward so that it is pointing toward the ground. Time of stimulation 3-5 seconds.

Supine Position – Hold the pup so that its back is resting in the palm of both hands with its muzzle facing the ceiling. The pup while on its back is allowed to sleep struggle. Time of stimulation 3-5 seconds.

Thermal Stimulation – Use a damp towel that has been cooled in a refrigerator for at least five minutes. Place the pup on the towel, feet down. Do not restrain it from moving. Time of stimulation 3-5 seconds.

These five exercises will produce neurological stimulations, none of which naturally occur during this early period of life. Experience shows that sometimes pups will resist these exercises, others will appear unconcerned. In either case a caution is offered to those who plan to use them. Do not repeat them more than once per day and do not extended the time beyond that recommended for each exercise. Over stimulation of the neurological system can have adverse and detrimental results. These exercises impact the neurological system by kicking it into action earlier than would be normally expected. The result being an increased capacity that later will help to make the difference in its performance. Those who play with their pups and routinely handle them should continue to do so because the neurological exercises are not substitutions for routine handling, play socialization or bonding.

Benefits of Stimulation

Five benefits have been observed in canines that were exposed to the Bio Sensor stimulation exercises. The benefits noted were:

Improved cardio vascular performance (heart rate)

Stronger heart beats

Stronger adrenal glands

More tolerance to stress and

Greater resistance to disease.

In tests of learning, stimulated pups were found to be more active and were more exploratory than their non-stimulated littermates over which they were dominant in competitive situations.

Secondary effects were also noted regarding test performance. In simple problem solving tests using detours in a maze, the non-stimulated pups became extremely aroused, whined a great deal, and made many errors. Their stimulated littermates were less disturbed or upset by test conditions and when comparisons were made, the stimulated littermates were more calm in the test environment, made fewer errors and gave only an occasional distress when stressed.

Hay is for Horses

The most important feedstuff that you will provide to your horse is hay. A lot of people focus on the grain that they feed their horse, however hay or forage is required for a healthy horse. Simply, horses can live healthily without grain, but not without hay or forage. Grain is a lower cost high energy concentrate that

allows less hay to be fed as hay is typically harder to come by and more expensive.

Hay for horses is most often sold in square bales that can weigh anywhere from 50 to 80lbs. Square bales are ideal for feeding horses because they are easy to store and transport



and also allow you to keep track of how much your horse is eating. If you are buying in bulk, a storage area is necessary. This area should be dry and ideally will keep sunlight off the hay. Round bales are also available but are not usually ideal for feeding horses. A downside to round bales is that you cannot keep track of how much the horse is eating. Also, if they are placed in the pasture for the horses to eat freely there tends to be a large amount of wasted hay.

Forage or roughage is required in a horses diet to aid in gut motility and digestion. A horses digestive tracts are set up to eat roughages and grasses. The grains that we now feed them are a supplement to what they really need. If you are lucky enough to have good pasture you may not need to purchase hay or grain. However, many of us do not have pasture that can sustain our horses. Therefore hay needs to be added into the horses diet.

When deciding what hay to feed your horse, geographic location will factor into your options. Certain grasses grow better in certain climates. The grasses that are native to your area will produce hay at a lower cost. Bringing hay in from other states can be a costly endeavor so buying local can be very cost effective. You should look for the highest quality hay available in your area. Hay should not contain dust, weeds or mold. It is also important that the hay is at the correct stage of maturity. As hay ages in the field it can begin to lose nutrients. Purchasing from a reputable hay maker will help to ensure the quality of your hay. Also, be sure to specify that you are looking for horse hay. Horses require higher quality hay than cattle or other ruminants can eat.



Hay is divided into two categories, grasses and legumes. Grasses include timothy, orchard

grass, fescue and coastal bermuda. The first three of which are cool season grasses while bermuda is a warm season grass. The cool season grasses have a slightly higher sugar content and are therefore more palatable for horses. While grasses have a

medium to low protein content they are considerably high in fiber. This means that grasses can easily be fed freely to a horse that is also receiving supplemental feed such as grain or oats etc.

Legumes include alfalfa and different types of clovers. These hays are highly palatable for horses. Alfalfa is the most common and readily available of the legumes. It is extremely high in protein providing up to 18 percent. Most horses require 10 to 11 percent protein. Alfalfa must be fed with care because of its high



calcium to phosphorus ratio. For this reason, horses should not be given free choice of alfalfa hay. The excess protein from the alfalfa will be converted into carbohydrates which will provide the horse with more energy. This can cause horses on a light work schedule to have excess energy and may not be suitable for all feeding programs.

If you need guidance in your feeding program the Cooperative Extension Service in your county is a good place to start. They provide services such as hay testing, soil samples and planting advice. Also, your local feed store should be able to provide names of reliable hay growers in your area. Be sure to inspect the hay before purchasing. Also, taking only a bale or two home to let your horses "test" the

hay can be a good idea. Some horses are picky about what they will eat and will end up wasting hay that they do not like. Wasted hay on the ground is the same as wasted money and no one wants that!

Stand for examination: Control dog in stand position gently so the doctor or groomer can work with your dog.

Sit on command for examining the head and neck, eyes, ears and nose.

Present paw for examination, hand shake, by you or another person.

Down flat on side on command for mild restraint, hands on shoulders and hips to be used during examination of extremities or for x-rays.

Down and roll over on their back for a belly-scratch, extend front and back legs gently, separately and then all together for examination or x-rays.



Do the Dew(claws)?

I work exclusively with canine athletes, developing rehabilitation programs for injured dogs or dogs that required surgery as a result of performance-related injuries. I have seen many dogs now, especially field trial/hunt test and agility dogs, that have had chronic carpal arthritis, frequently so severe that they have to be retired or at least carefully managed for the rest of their careers. Of the over 30 dogs I have seen with carpal arthritis, only one has had dewclaws.





Figure 1. Anatomical diagram viewing the medial side of a dog's left front leg demonstrating the five tendons that attach to the dewclaw.

If you look at anatomy book (Miller's Guide to the Anatomy of Dogs is an excellent one – see Figure 1 below) you will see that there are 5 tendons attached to the dewclaw. Of course, at the other end of a tendon is a muscle, and that means that if you cut off the dew claws, there are 5 muscle bundles that will become atrophied from disuse.

Those muscles indicate that the dewclaws have a function. That function is to prevent torque on the leg. Each time the foot lands on the ground, particularly when the dog is cantering or galloping (see Figure 2), the dewclaw is in touch with the ground. If the dog then needs to turn, the dewclaw digs into the ground to support the lower leg and prevent torque. If the dog doesn't have a dewclaw, the leg twists. A lifetime of that and the result can be carpal arthritis, or perhaps injuries to other joints, such as the elbow, shoulder and toes. Remember: the dog is doing the activity regardless, and the pressures on the leg have to go somewhere.

Perhaps you are thinking, "None of my dogs have ever had carpal pain or arthritis." Well, we need to remember that dogs, by their very nature, do not tell us about mild to moderate pain. If a dog was to be asked by an emergency room nurse to give the level of his pain on a scale from 0 to 10, with 10 being the worst, their scale would be 0,0,0,0,6,7,8,9,10. Most of our dogs, especially if they deal with pain that is of gradual onset, just deal with it and don't complain unless it is excruciating. But when I palpate the carpal joints of older dogs without dewclaws, I frequently can elicit pain with relatively minimal manipulation.

As to the possibility of injuries to dew claws. Most veterinarians will say that such injuries actually are not very common at all. And if they do occur, then they are dealt with like any other injury. In my opinion, it is far better to deal with an injury than to cut the dew claws off of all dogs "just in case."

Lee had not been well for several weeks when I stopped by to see him last year, after the running of the central futurity at Wayne Fitzgerrell State Park, not far from his home in Whittington, Illinois. A spell of the flu had kept him in bed for a time. In the few days before my visit he had improved and was ready to chat about some of the dogs and people of long ago.

Probably no other person had so much to do with the early and continued development of the field trial Brittany in the United States as did Lee. He recalls clearly the time when field trial competition for the breed was just beginning.

As a young man in rural Franklin County, Illinois, Lee trained pointers and setters on his own account and in the employ of the professionals Claude Tuttle, of Ina, and Evan Mansel, of McLeansboro. The latter had some Britts in his string and advised Lee to specialize in the breed. From Mr. Mansel, more than 40 years ago, Lee acquired some foundation stock.

Franklin and Williamson counties were rich in game in those days. Lee could ride horseback from his door and put dogs quickly on wild birds. A gentleman name Mike Burnham, who had come from Texas to Illinois in the oil business, brought Lee a Brit that had exceptional talents in finding birds. "I broke him in 10 days, " Lee recalled.

As he grew interested in our conversation, Lee fastened his clear, level gaze upon me and looked much as he had when I first knew him many years before.

There was to be a field trial for Brittanys near St. Louis in 1945 or 1946, and Mr. Burnham asked Lee to enter the dog he had been working for him. Lee hesitated--"I knew nothing about field trials"—but Mr. Burnham persisted, and drove Lee and the dog to St. Louis.

The St. Louis trial had attracted persons interested in the breed from considerable distances. Alan Stuyvesant was there from New Jersey and Lucien Ufford from Connecticut, Lee recalled. The dog he handled performed well at a time, Lee said, when few expected the niceties of manner that are standard today.

He especially remembered that a solid back, from a considerable distance, attracted much attention. Some then believed, according to Lee, that Brittanies "wouldn't back."

As a result of that performance, Lee remembered, Mr. Stuyvesant left two dogs with him, other dogs came to him, and within a week of that trial in St. Luis, he had added five or six Brittanies to his string. It is safe to say that he was never thereafter without dogs of the breed until his days as a trainer and handler ended many years later.

Lee first went to Canada for summer training in 1950, eventually acquiring property near Pierson, Manitoba, where Jim, Janice, and Chad still go to put the summer finish on their dogs. Lee's last trip to Canada was in 1975.

The Holman summer training grounds near Pierson were quite close to those of John S. Gates, and Jim and John Rex were boys there together. They spent as much time as could be spared from the dogs fishing for walleye and northern pike.

"Lee, has the breed improved?" I asked. A long pause on his part to consider, then: "Well, there are more good ones now, but some when I began were of equal of any running now."

The name of Uno's Jet had been on Lee's tongue several times, and when I asked "could you name the best dog you ever had?" again there was a thoughtful pause. Then he named Jet once more. Lee did not say Jet was the best but in that context Jet was the only dog that he mentioned. Perhaps he was only being diplomatic in view of the many clients for whom he handled good dogs.

Lee puts much emphasis on a dog's intelligence, as an important quality, and in that regard he rated Jet highly. He would do what he was trained to do," Lee said. Jet could understand what was wanted of him in almost human fashion. Even after many years the details of Jet's untimely death were clear in Lee's mind.

We talked about conformation. A dog poorly put together has little chance to make a dependable hunting companion, in Lee's opinion. He places much importance on strong, compact feet and on legs correctly attached to the dog's body. Eyes should be "chisel shaped," he feels, and tight lidded, to keep out weed seeds and other foreign Material.

I left Lee after an hour, feeling it a privilege to be allowed to share his knowledge. He is truly one of the great pioneers of the Brittany breed in the United States.

End note: Lee did not live very long after my visit. I remember that Lloyd Conable came from New York for the funeral. That one would come so far indicates the regard in which Lee was held. While we were at the Whittington cemetery paying our last respects the bobwhite were calling in the nearby hedge rows.

Where's the Beef?

- Where you place the reward is key in training. When you ask the dog to perform a behavior close to you, you should deliver the beef (reward) close to your body. When you ask the dog to perform a behavior at a distance, it's best to deliver the beef at a distance.
- Try this test: when your dog is 10 feet away from you, ask your dog to sit or down. Does the dog respond instantly, on the first command, to sit/down 10 feet away? Or does he come to you and then sit at your side? Or not sit at all? If so, there's a hole in your training you might want to fix.
- Usually we begin teaching the dog skills when it's close to us. For example, we teach our puppy to sit at our side by rewarding at our side with a favorite toy or food. Once the pup learns to sit on command, we may want to progress to sitting far away from us. When the dog sits, we should *reward the dog at that distance*, ideally while he's still sitting. If instead we call the dog to come to us and give the food at our side, coming is rewarded, while sitting at a distance is ignored. Over time, the dog is less likely to sit at a distance if all he gets is rewards from your hand.
- Another example is in agility, where we send our dog to go out and perform a jump at a distance. If we always reward at our side, the dog just doesn't have any incentive to send away for jumps. If we reward the dog for jumping at a distance, the dog will be motivated to jump at a distance.

So how can you deliver rewards at a distance? You could:

- Praise by saying "yes" when the dog is jumping at a distance
- Throw a piece of food
- Throw a toy
- Throw a sock with food inside and rush out to unwrap the food
- Place a target plate just after the jump. As soon as the dog touches the plate, you rush out to put the food on the plate. (Do it at home with an empty plate or coaster), or
- You release the dog a life reward, like opening the gate so he can go for a run.
- Once your dog is performing consistently at a small distance, you can gradually build the distance. Any time your dog fails a few times in a row, think about whether you went too far too fast. Make it a bit easier so the dog can succeed, and then work towards building more distance more slowly next time.



- Enough tips. Redo the test: when your dog is 10 feet away from you, ask your dog to sit or down. When he responds, say "yes" and then throw the reward over his head so he's running away from you to get the reward. If you repeat this for a minute every day for a week, you'll be on your way to improving your Brittany's distance work.

Knowing First Aid Can Save Your Dog's Life

Several easy techniques can also easy indicate general health

Too few dog owners know what to do in case of an emergency with their pet. All pet owners should have a working knowledge of first aid and CPR should an emergency arise and minutes count.

Equally important is recognizing what's normal for your dog--how he usually walks, sleeps, eats, urinates and defecates, says Elizabeth Rozanski, DVM, a specialist in emergency and critical care at Cummings School of Veterinary Medicine at Tufts University. Simple procedures like checking the health of his gums, taking his pulse and knowing his normal heart rate can provide valuable information to a veterinarian in an emergency. Smart owners will be prepared by keeping the contact information of your veterinary clinic and emergency veterinary clinic handy.

AMONG HELPFUL FIRST-AID TECHNIQUES: CHECKING THE GUMS

Healthy gums are pink and moist. Pale, white or blue gums can signal a problem such as shock or anemia, which is a low-red cell count. The best way to check the gums is a couple millimeters above the canine. (A millimeter is slightly more than a third of an inch.) Lift up your dog's muzzle and press lightly with your finger on the gum area above the canine tooth. It should return to a pink color within a couple seconds.

TAKING THE PULSE

The number of heart beats per minute varies by size, with larger dogs having a slower rate. It's good to know your dog's normal rate. If it's usually 80 and now is 150, that can mean he's in trouble. A rapidly beating heart can indicate shock or pain. To take your dog's pulse, lay him on his right side. The follow these steps:

- --Gently lift his upper hind leg away from the lower hind leg.
- --Place two fingers as high up as possible on the inside of the leg where the leg meets the body.
- --Feel for a recess in the middle of the leg about half way between the front and back. This is where the blood vessels are located and where you'll find the pulse.
- --Count the number of pulses in 10 seconds and multiply that number by six to give you the beats per minute.

If you are unsure about how to take the pulse, ask your veterinarian or vet technician to show you on your dog the next time you are in for a visit.

CHECKING BREATHING IN AN UNCONSCIOUS DOG

Place your hand on the dog's side to feel if the chest is moving up and down. You can also hold a mirror near his mouth. If it fogs up, he's breathing. If he's not, you may need to perform CPR in this order of priorities:

--Airway: Check the throat and mouth for foreign objects.

- --Breathing: If your dog isn't breathing, place your mouth over his muzzle if he weighs more than 30 pounds. Seal his entire snout with your mouth if he weighs less than 30 pounds and gently exhale until you see the chest rise. Give four or five breaths rapidly and then check to see if your dog is breathing without assistance.
- --Circulation: If you can't detect a heartbeat or pulse, you'll need to perform chest compressions. Ask your veterinarian how to perform them.

STOPPING BLEEDING IN A WOUND

If your dog is bleeding due to a cut or a bite, the first advice from Dr. Rozanski is: "Don't panic. Dogs have more blood than you think. Put pressure on the wound, but do not take it off to see if the bleeding has stopped. If you don't have a first-aid kit handy, a towel and duct tape work well. Always keep towels in your car."

To avoid being bitten when treating an injured, conscious dog, you can create a homemade muzzle by ripping strips from a towel or T-shirt. Approach the dog from the side--not directly head on-- and talk in a calm voice. (If the dog was hit by a car, make sure he's in a safe area, and, if necessary, stop traffic.) Take a cloth strip and tie it around the dog's nose and then behind the ears. Even a sweet tempered dog with a broken pelvis or other injury might bite.

If you're able to treat the wound, it is better to not use peroxide to clean it. Dr. Rozanski says "Peroxide is bad for wounds. It delays healing." A better alternative would be to use sterile saline solution or tap water.

HELPING A DOG WHO IS CHOKING

If your dog is choking on food or a toy and is conscious, approach him cautiously to avoid being bitten. Open his mouth and carefully sweep the inside with your finger to dislodge the object, Pull the tongue forward. If you can't dislodge the object, you'll need to perform these abdominal thrusts:

- --If you can lift your dog, hoist him by his front legs with his spine against your chest and wrap your arms around him under his ribs. Make a fist with one hand, place your other hand over your fist and give five rapid abdominal thrusts, lifting your fist in an inward and upward motion. Just be gentle, as you would be working on a baby.
- --If your dog is too big to lift, place him on his side. Put the palms of your hands below his rib cage and give five rapid abdominal thrusts in an inward and upward motion.
- --Check his mouth to see if the object has been dislodged.

Giardia A handout from Bethany Veterinary Hospital

What are Giardia?

Giardia are sometimes confused with "worms" because they invade the gastrointestinal tract and can cause diarrhea. Giardia are one-celled parasites classified as protozoa.

Most dogs that are infected with Giardia do not have diarrhea or any other signs of illness. When the eggs (cysts) are found in the stool of a dog without diarrhea, they are generally considered a transient, insignificant finding. However, in puppies and debilitated adult dogs, they may cause severe, watery diarrhea that may be fatal.

How did my dog get Giardia?

A dog becomes infected with Giardia when it swallows the cyst stage of the parasite. Once inside the dog's intestine, the cyst goes through several stages of maturation. Eventually, the dog is able to pass infective cysts in the stool. These cysts lie in the environment and can infect other dogs. Giardia may also be transmitted through drinking infected water.

How is Giardiasis diagnosed?

Giardiasis or infection with Giardia is diagnosed by performing an in-hospital Giardia test. The cysts are quite small and usually require a special floatation medium for detection, so they are not normally found on routine fecal examinations. Occasionally, the parasites may be seen on a direct smear of the feces.

How is giardiasis treated?

The typical drug used to kill Giardia is metronidazole, an antibiotic. It is normally given

for 5-7 days to treat giardiasis. Other drugs are also used if diarrhea and dehydration occur. If metronidazole is not effective, other medications may be recommended.

Can humans become infected with Giardia?

Giardia can also cause diarrhea in humans. Therefore, environmental disinfection is important. The use of diluted chlorine bleach at 1:30 or 1:16 dilutions (one cup in a gallon or 500 ml in 4 liters of water) is effective in killing the cysts. Giardia cysts are very susceptible to drying. We recommend thoroughly cleaning the pet's areas and then allowing it to dry for several days before reintroducing pets.





- American Brittany Futurities shall be open to every purebred Brittany bitch and her progeny whelped during the calendar year of January 1 December 31 and whose litters have been enrolled with The American Brittany Club.
- Bitch must be owned or leased by an American Brittany club member.
- All dams nominated and all sires bred to must be registered or eligible for registration.
- Nominations of dams must be made within 30 days after the bitches have whelped. A sum of \$30.00 must be paid at this time. This payment will entitle each puppy of this particular litter to be entered in the ABC Futurities (Field and/or Bench) after the dog has been properly registered in a recognized stud book.
- Late litter nominations will be accepted with the following current fee schedule: Late litter nominations will be accepted as late as 180 days from whelping. In addition to the Nomination fee of \$30.00 the late fees are \$30.00 for 31-60 days, \$60.00 for 61-90 days, and \$100.00 for 91-180 days. 
